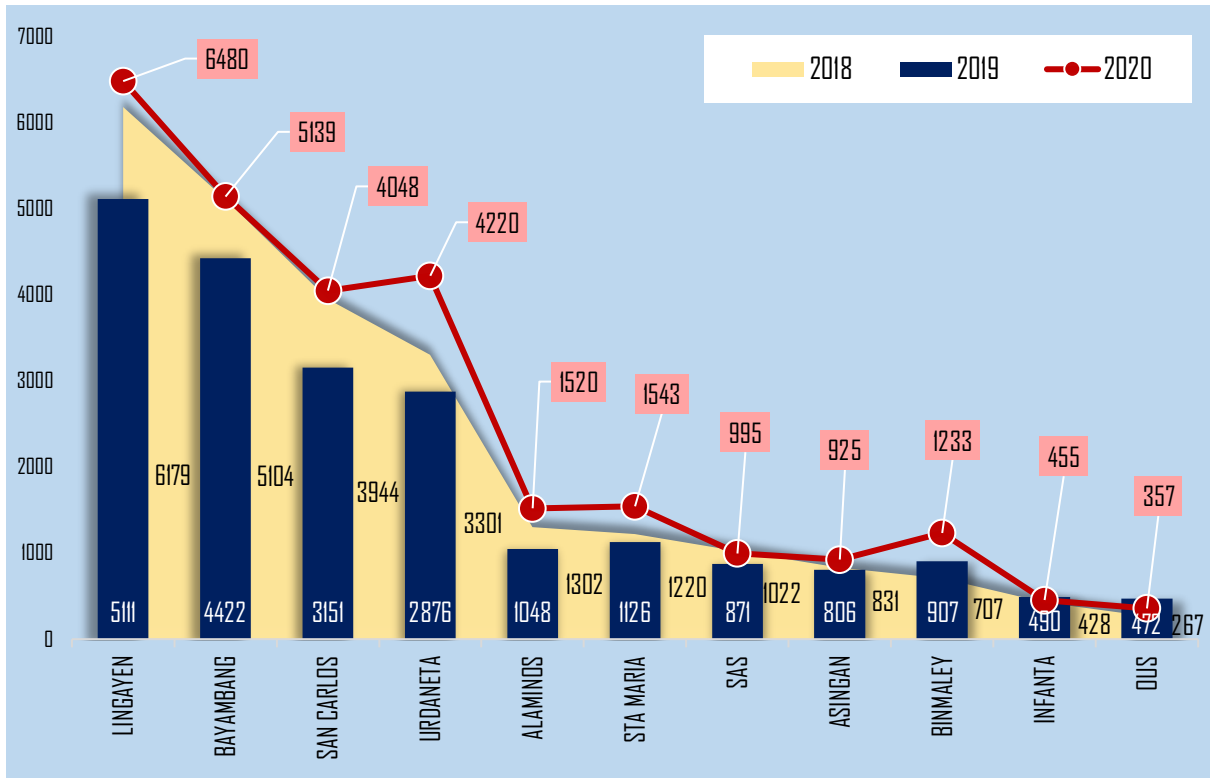

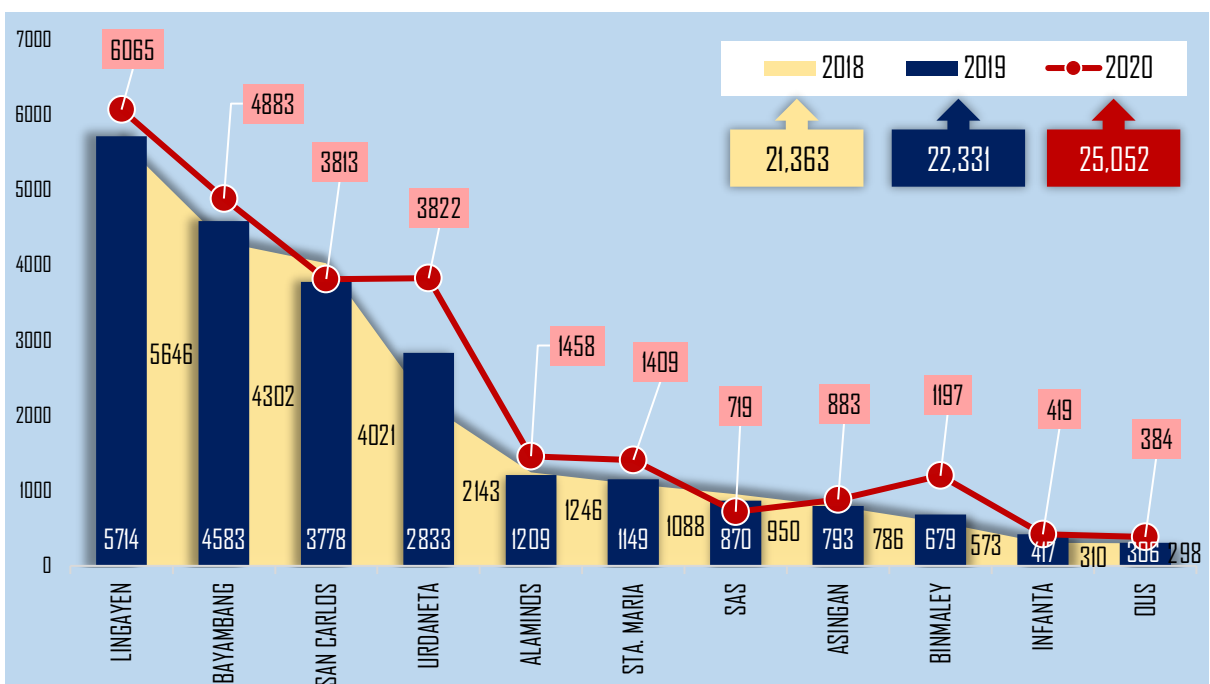

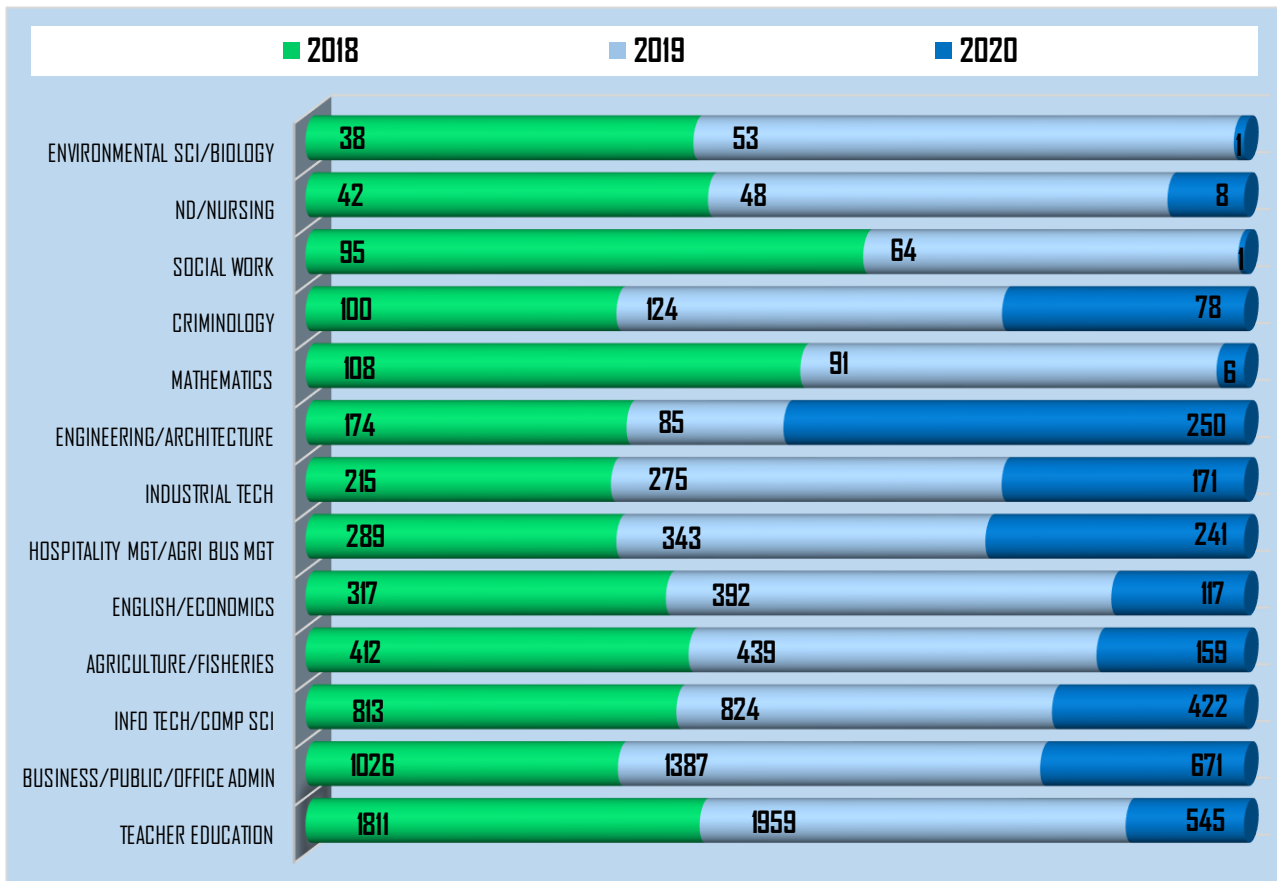
FIRST SEMESTER ENROLLMENT BY CAMPUS



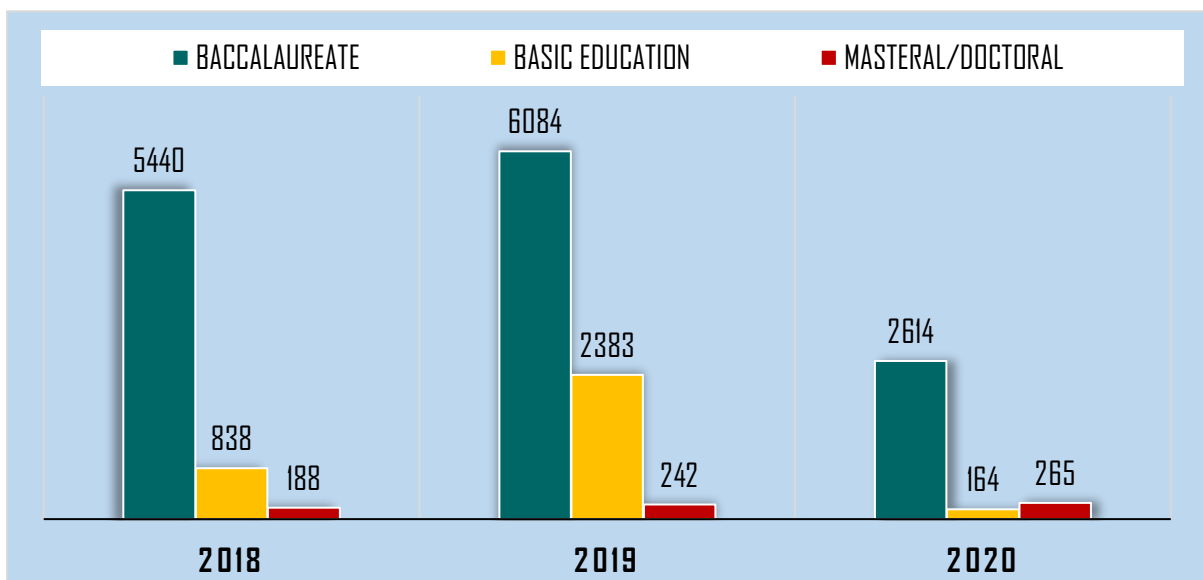
SECOND SEMESTER ENROLLMENT BY CAMPUS



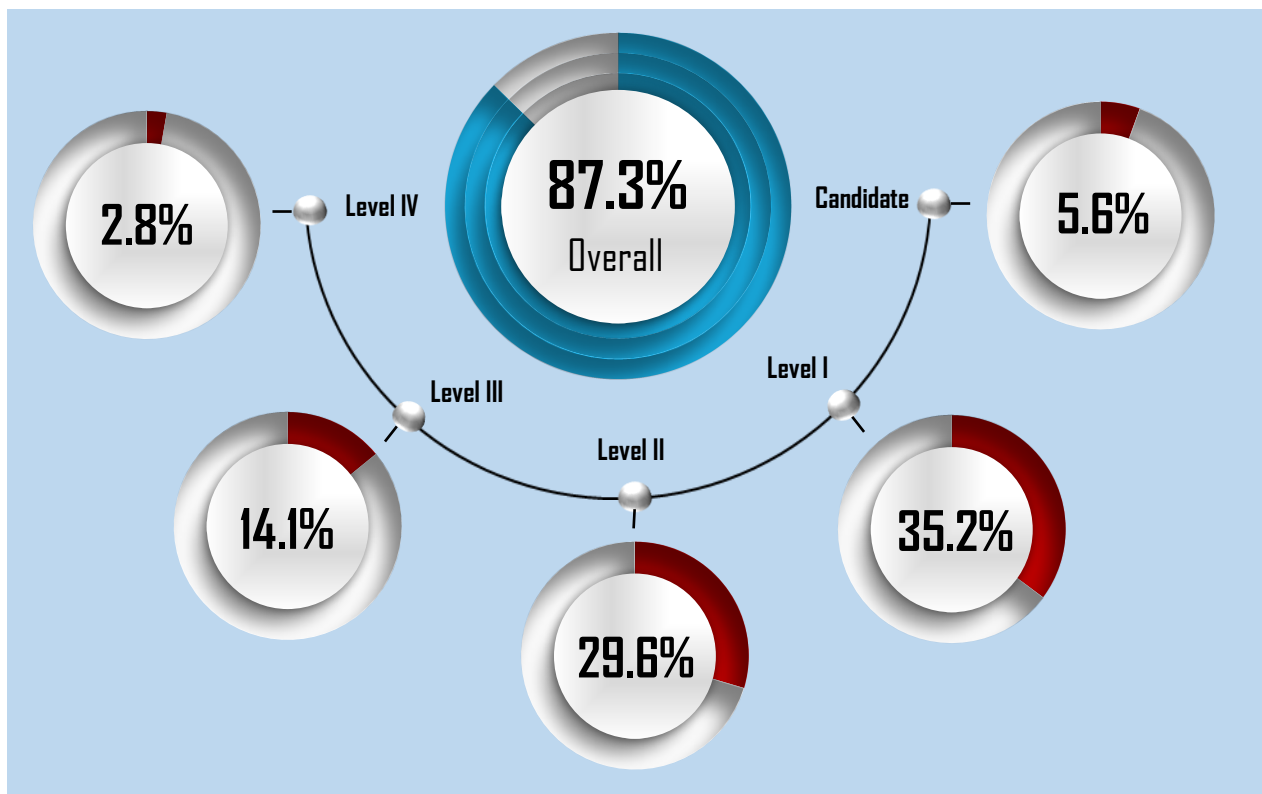
GRADUATES BY CLUSTERED DEGREE PROGRAMS



GRADUATES BY LEVEL



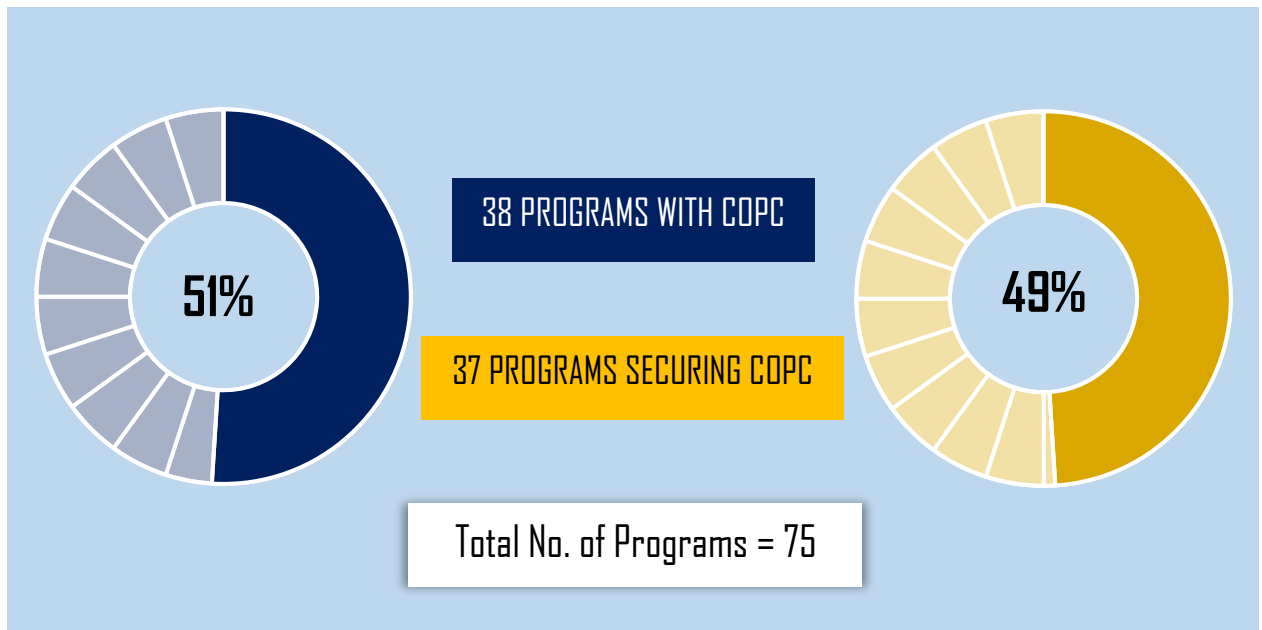

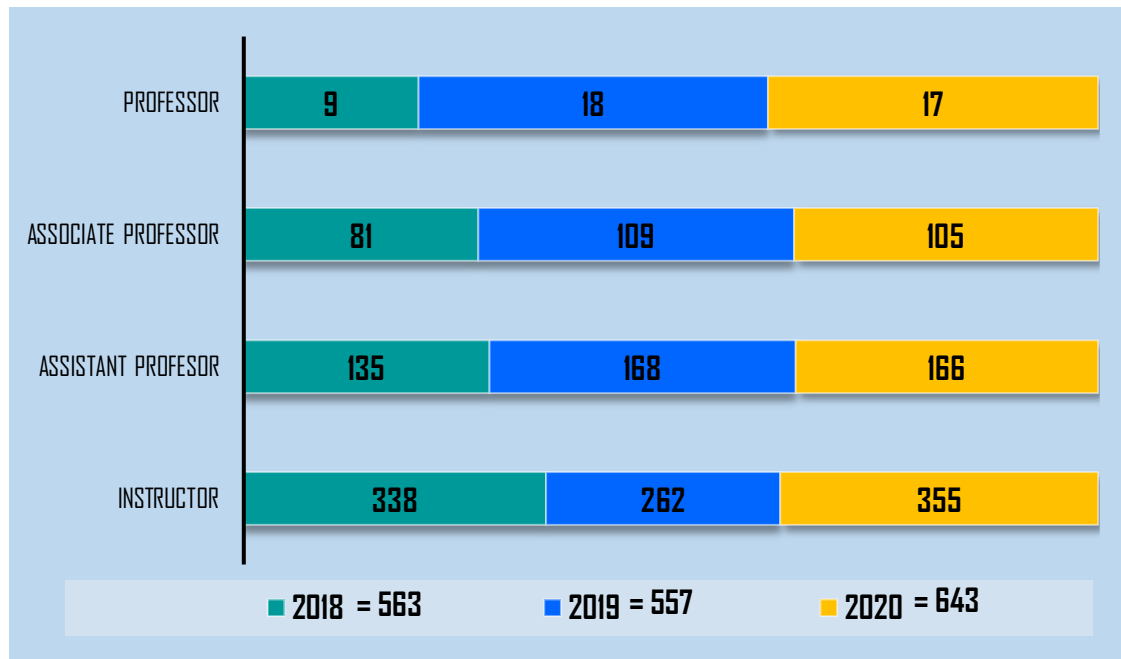

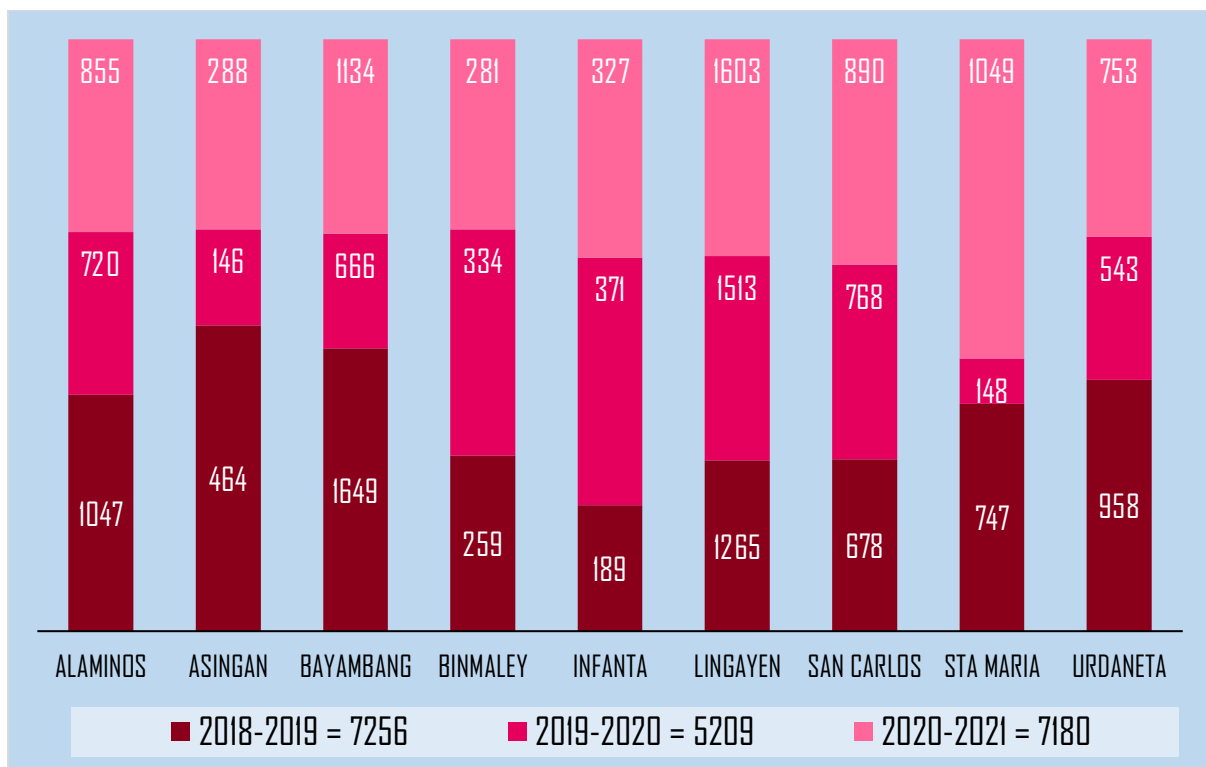

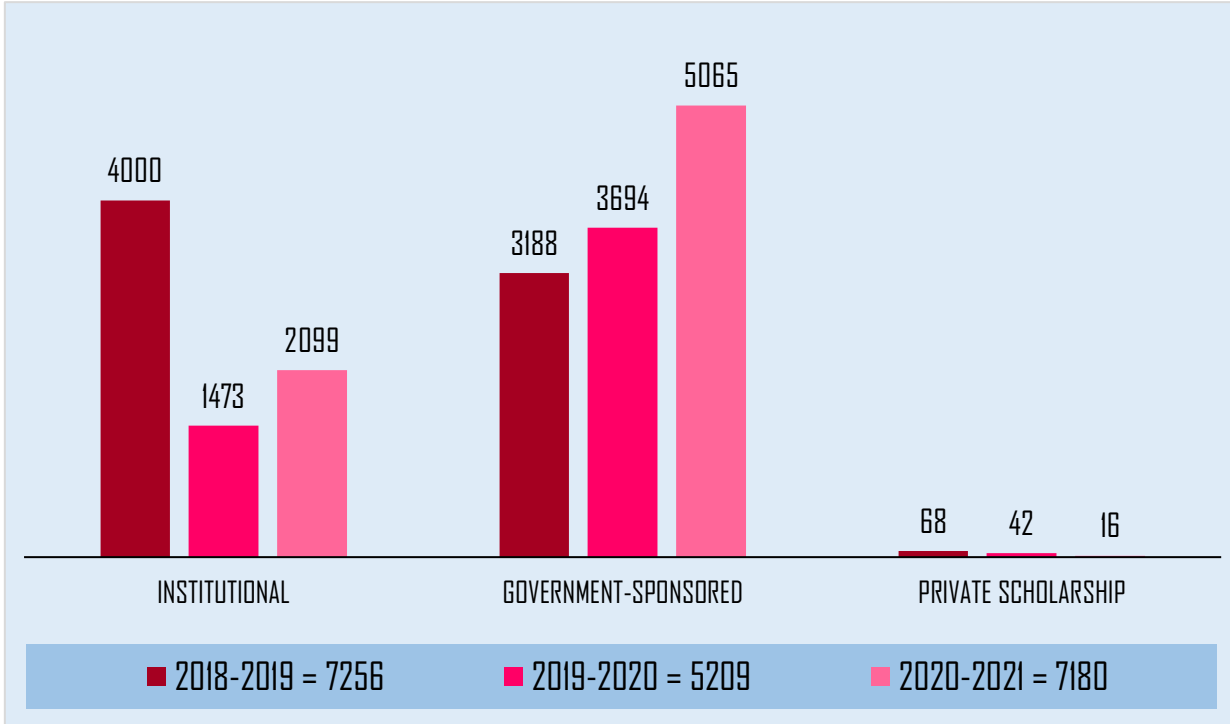
FACULTY PROFILE BY ACADEMIC RANK



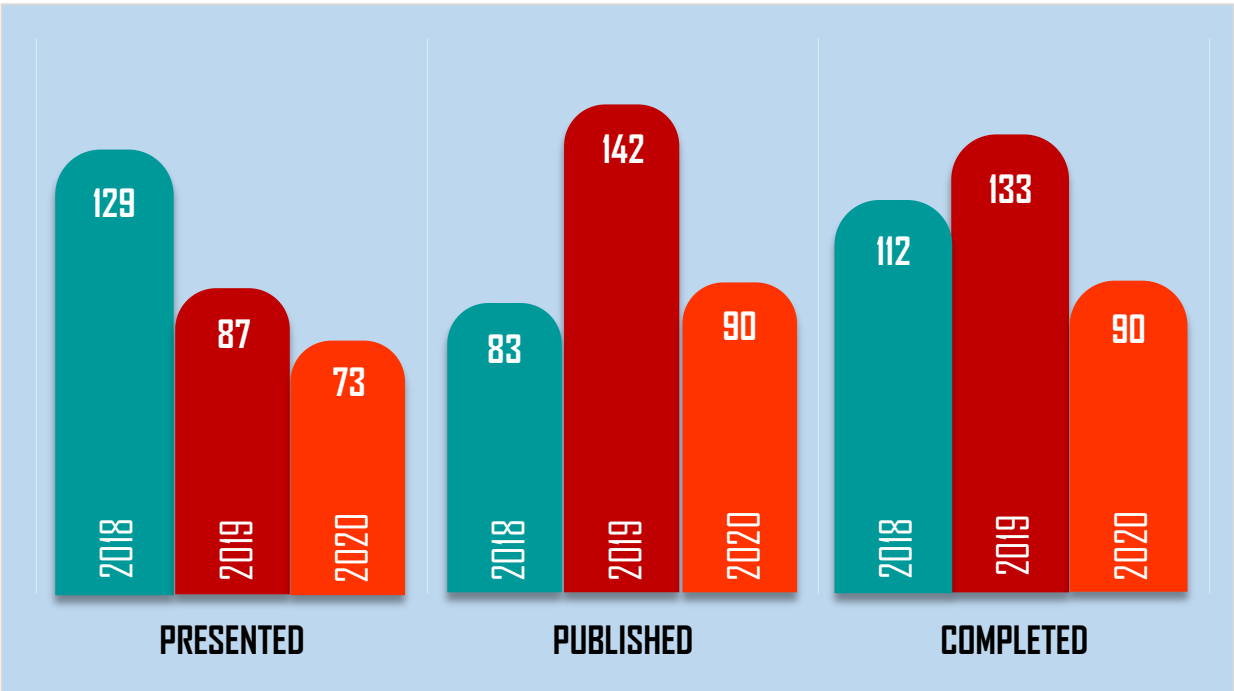
STUDENT SCHOLARSHIP BY CAMPUS



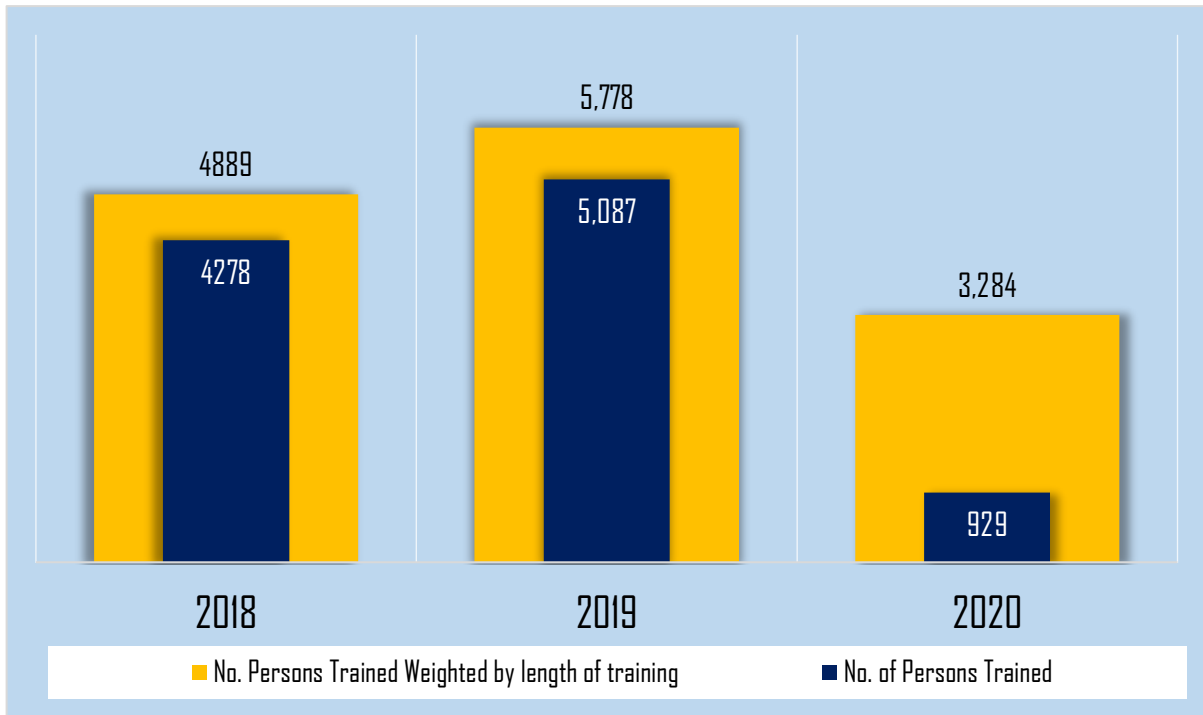
STUDENT SCHOLARSHIP BY TYPE



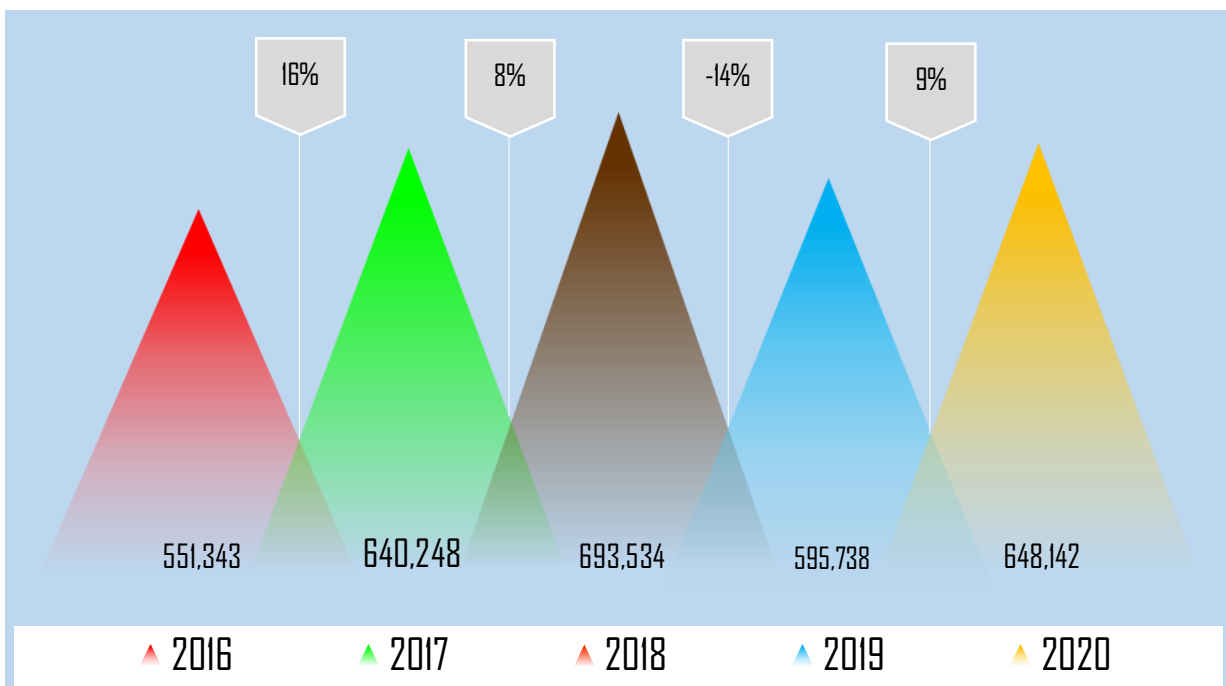

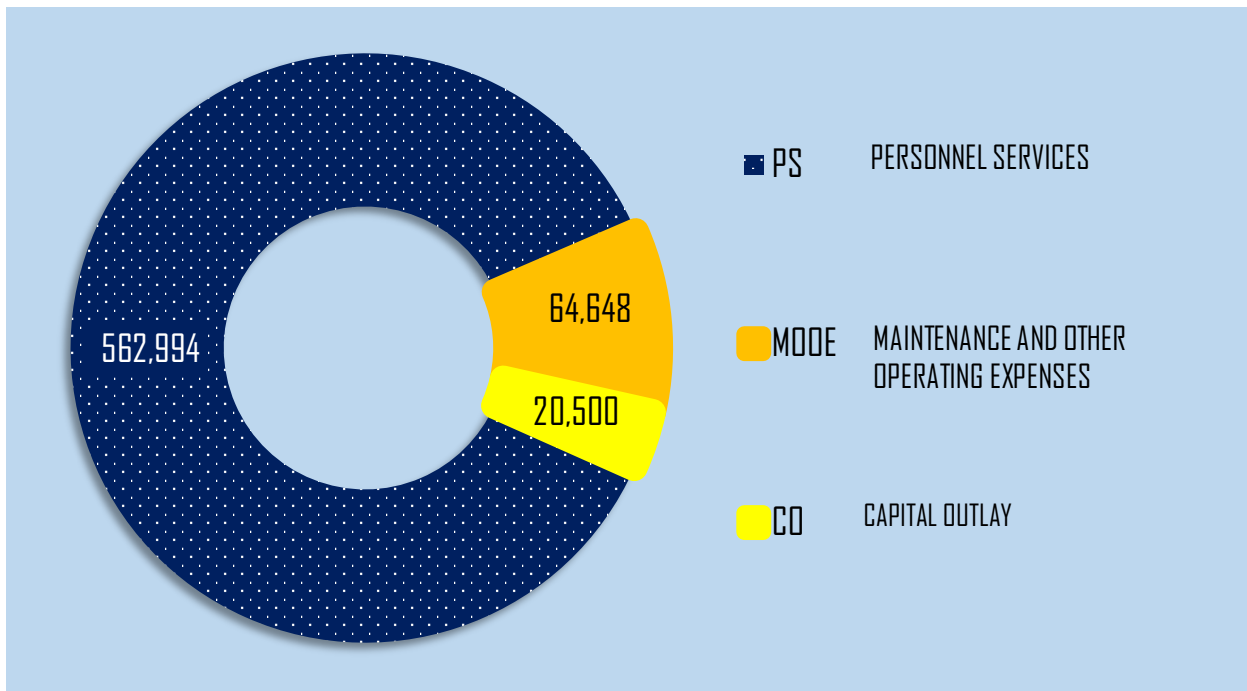

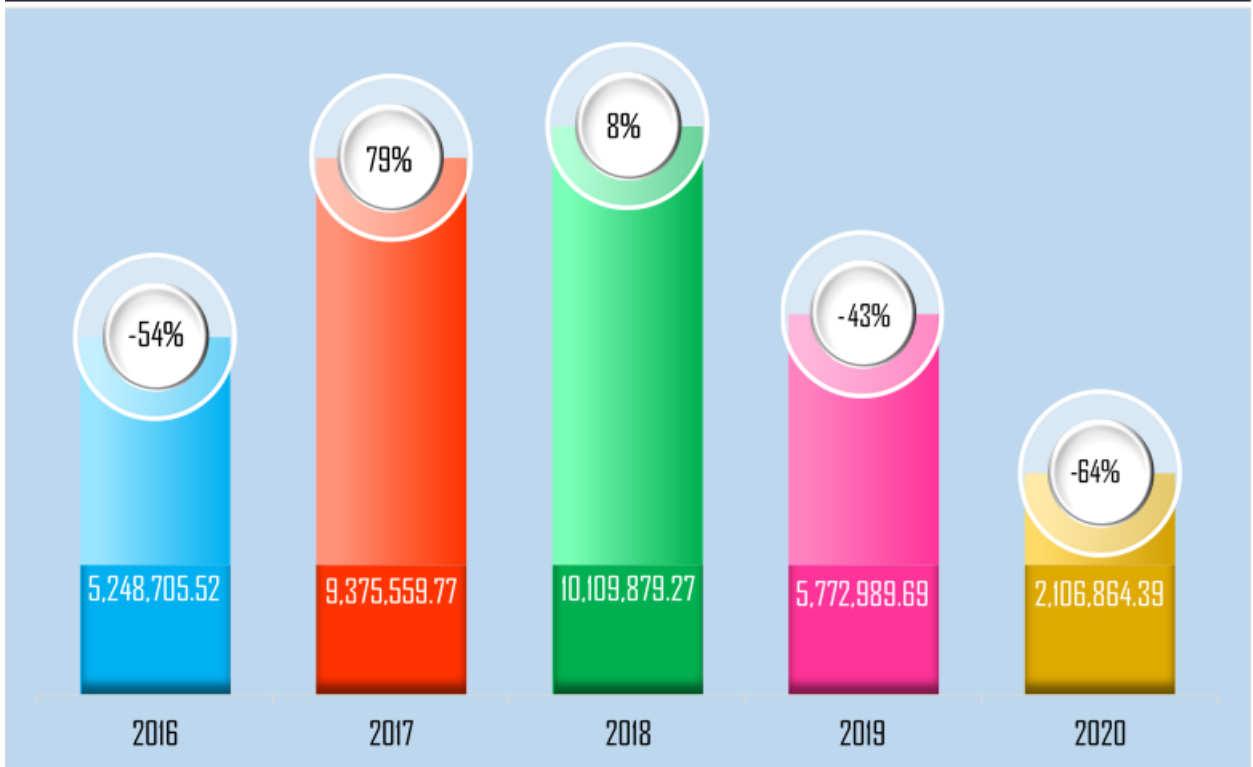
ACTUAL BUDGET 2016-2020



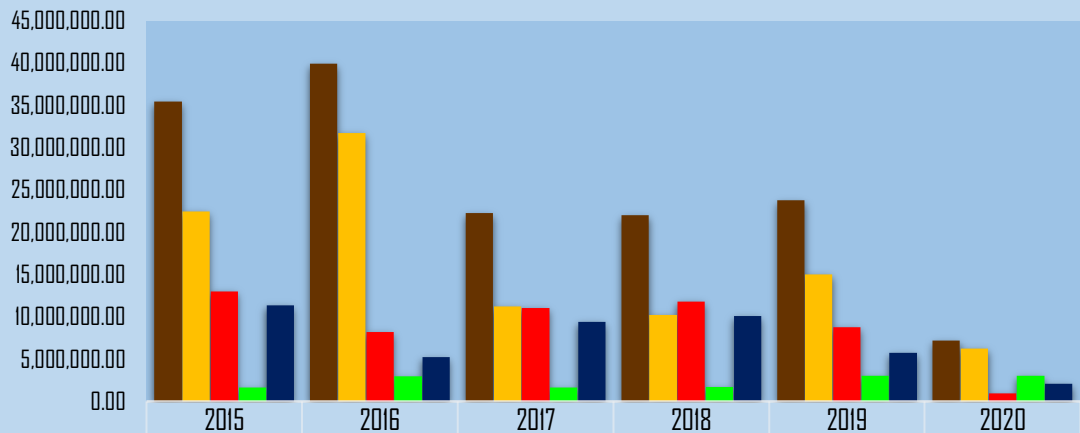
2020 BUDGET BY EXPENSE CLASS



INCOME GENERATING PROJECTS 2016 -2020



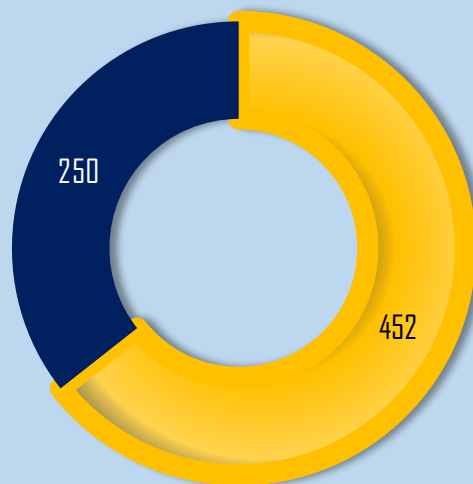

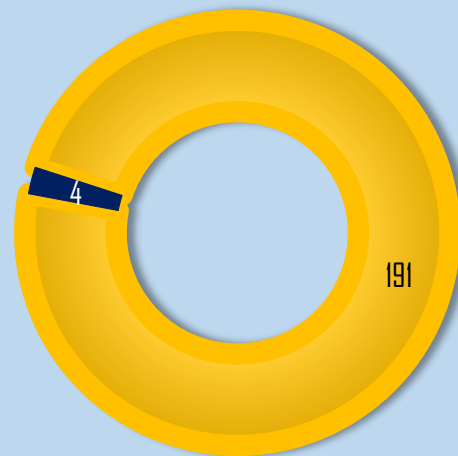

FLEXIBLE LEARNING IN PSU CONTEXT

The word “flexible” literally means to be easily adapted, managed or molded. It is a stint that conjures up visions of the suppleness of youth, or the malleability of clay. Added as a prefix to educational practices, to define learning as flexible connotes the freedom of learners from potential participatory barriers of education as a resource availability, family support and commitment, financial challenges, internet connectivity and learner’s geographic location.

In addition, flexible learning is a state of being in which learning and teaching is increasingly freed from the limitations of the time, place and pace of study. But this kind of flexibility does not end there. For learners, flexibility in learning may include choices in relation to entry and exit points, selection of learning activities, assessment tasks and educational resources in return for different kinds of credit and costs. And for the teachers it can involve choices in relation to the allocation of their time and the mode and methods of communication with learners as well as the educational institution.



In the context of Pangasinan State University, flexible learning is operationally defined as the use of a combination of available and accessible learning modalities (emphasis on the students' resources) to deliver the subject matter with the end goal of giving utmost concern in the acquisition of the intended competency-based learning outcomes. The flexible learning mode must have a teaching-learning structure that puts premium consideration both in face to face (F2F) and home-based (HB) class environment or remote teaching requirements with the capacity of the students to own and use the required instructional resources (cellphone, laptop/desktop computers, internet connectivity, modules, e books/journals etc.), so that the content (subject matter) given is the expected competency of a given subject. The dimensions of flexibility of learning in the context of the University includes flexible delivery mode, flexible time, flexible student grouping, flexible place or location and flexible assessment tools.

For flexible delivery mode, delivery of the lessons shall be based on the availability and readiness of the students to own and make use of the learning resources designed for the subject. This could either be formal virtual learning space (LMS platforms like Google Classroom and Moodle) or informal virtual learning space (Facebook, YouTube, etc.), print-based, and blended online. In PSU, the primary learning platform use by learners is MS Teams because it serves several features that caters the need of the students and teachers. At the start of classes, the students will be given the opportunity to select the combination of delivery

mode he/she can avail or access to engage in the teaching-learning process. In this case, the emphasis is flexibility on what delivery mode of learning shall be adopted by giving the students the chance to choose the delivery mode he/she prefers while at home.

On the other hand, to ensure flexible learning time in PSU, the design of the allotted hours for the residential class or campus-based class depends on the hour requirement of the subject unit load. However, this can be modified to suit the situation at a particular time. For instance, the time allotted for a course with a laboratory will be shortened, and the activities will be given as a home-based activity.

As applied in the University, class schedules are given to the students. At the start of class, students are oriented on the requirements, grading system, and the learning contents of the subject. As the classes go on, there might be students that need extra time on a certain topic, i.e., Calculus and Statistics concept. This group of students can be given spare time to discuss the lesson. All the students with the same request for additional time for discussion will be grouped, and a tutorial class is scheduled for them. More so, in PSU the delivery of lessons is a combination of residential (in campus of F2F) for an hour per week or 8 weeks per semester for a 3-unit course and 36 hours for home-based (off-campus).

Given the different alternative delivery modes, this requires various assessment tools to ensure that the learnings acquired are objectively assessed. Hence, relevant and appropriate rubrics to evaluate the performance of the students for each delivery mode used shall be prepared and utilized.

It is a flexible learning environment that aims to optimize student engagement and collaboration without compromising the intended competency-based learning outcomes regardless of what instructional delivery mode will be used. The University's flexible learning environment will consider the available resources and capability of both the teachers and the students for the delivery of the lessons, creation of tutorial class based on student performance, time spent for a subject and location on where and how the lessons will be delivered.

VPAASS CLINCHES FLEXIBLE LEARNING FRAMEWORK AND GUIDELINES

To address the concerns on flexible learning, the Office of the Vice President for Academic Affairs and Support Services decided to create a Technical Working Group (TWG) composed of faculty members. Vice President, Dr. Manolito Manuel called a meeting on October 15 and 16 with the appointed faculty members to discuss the crafting of supplemental guidelines which will be presented to the academic council. Stated guidelines were: (1) Construction of printed flexible learning materials by program (2) Examination grading system (3) Monitoring of online and modular class (4) Validation of study guide. Faculty members gear up to align their curriculum and instructional materials to flexible learning as the new normal in education.

In the same way, Dr. Manolito Manuel convened with the Campus Executive Directors, Council of Deans and chairpersons in a virtual meeting on October 19 to deliberate the proposed supplemental guidelines to address the concerns from the faculty meeting last October 9.

The participants had later approved the stated mechanisms of distributing the printed study guides, monitoring and evaluation of classes, grading system for both online and modular classes, and the rubrics for the content validation of materials.

Prior to the new normal, courses are delivered heavily through face to face classes. In order to come up with content that is appropriate to an instructional delivery mode, there is a need to ask the end-users— the students and the teachers. A review of the existing curricular program outcomes was done as a basis in identifying the outcomes appropriate for each course. The instructional design of each course which consists of learning outcomes, learning activities, learning activities, and learning assessment, are aligned on the instructional delivery mode to be used by each faculty.



The course syllabi, course guides, and study guides are harmonized. All campuses offering the same program shall come up with the same course syllabus, course guides, and study guides, which are divided and prepared by all faculty handling the same course regardless of the campus. The final flexible learning materials developed will be utilized as a guide in the delivery of the lessons either face-to-face and online or pure online. The delivery mode to be used is supported by the assistance of the LGUs particularly in the provision of learning space, Wi-Fi-connectivity, tablets and the distribution of study guides/modules. Likewise, the PHL CHED Connect will be used to serve as additional platform for the teaching-learning process. It contains higher education materials in various formats that are useful for teaching, learning and research purposes. (PSU Echoes Vol. XX No.1)

MANUEL: Flexible Learning is Our Shared Responsibility

Flexible learning environment aims to optimize student engagement and collaboration without compromising the intended competency-based learning outcomes regardless of what instructional delivery mode will be used. The University's flexible learning environment will consider the available resources and capability of both the teachers and the students for the delivery of the lessons, creation of tutorial class based on student performance, time spent for a subject and location on where and how the lessons will be delivered.

During the board meeting for the planning and implementation of Flexible Learning, Dr. Manolito C. Manuel, Vice President for Academic Affairs and Support Services along with the University officials have identified the key problem which is the gadget compatible for the use of LMS platforms particularly MS Teams.

As such, Hon. Elmer C. Vingua, President of the Federated Faculty Association proposed that a tablet be accorded to the faculty members with permanent status. In the same way, the Student Regent, Hon. Je-Ann De Vera also suggested that a tablet be granted to deserving students to empower them in learning during the New Normal.

“Overcoming the problems identified in the implementation of the Flexible Learning is our shared responsibility. And through the concerted efforts of all the offices and departments, we will manage to overcome all the challenges of Flexible Learning Modality,” said Dr. Manuel.

For this reason, after the bidding conducted by the university, with a total budget of 7.4 million pesos, nine hundred eleven (911) units of Lenovo tablets which are compatible to LMS platforms were purchased. Seven hundreds (700) of which will be distributed to Faculty members and the rest to deserving students of Pangasinan State University.

“In addition to the tablets that will be distributed to our deserving students, I am encouraging Faculty members to sponsor additional students by lending your own tablets to further encompass the solutions we have already started,” shared by Dr. Dexter R. Buted.

Students are the stakeholders who are primarily engaged in the teaching-learning process. In this time of pandemic, the University will continuously provide various support to the students who are economically deprived. And so, flexible learning is learner-centered, encouraging greater independence and autonomy on the part of the learner. Its ethos is to enable and empower learners and give them greater control of their learning and become more self-directed. It increases choices available to both learners and teachers resulting in increasing efficiencies in delivery of education (PSU Echoes, Vol XX No.2).

That way, we can help one another ease the troubled minds of our people and make them feel that the government through the Pangasinan State University is in control of ensuring that their dreams about their future is still possible."

1st Operational ICT Konek in Pangasinan

the ICT Konek Project of Pangasinan State University with Hon. Kenneth Marco Perez, Municipal Mayor of San Manuel last August 19, the town's two storey, fully furnished building is the newest internet hub for hundreds of San Manuelians as of October 27, 2020. It is notable that one of the best practices of PSU is its linkages and partnership with the Local government Units (LGUs) which paved way for the dawning of the ICT Konek.

Students from Urdaneta City, Sta. Maria and Asingan will roister online learning amidst the pandemic. It is the primordial goal of the said project to hammer out online mode of learning and make it accessible to rural and remote areas. Hat tip to the Local Government Unit of San Manuel, focal persons and especially the officials of Pangasinan State University headed by Dr. Dexter R. Buted for creating a learning space for all students.

Among the 26 municipalities who signed a memorandum of agreement with PSU for the ICT Konek Project, San Manuel is the very first LGU to blast off the said project. Indeed, alone we can do so little, but together we can do as much.

PSU-BC Rings Up the Curtain for ICT Konek at Basista

November 10, 2020 – Another historical feat achieved as Pangasinan State University – Bayambang Campus (PSU-BC) led by the University President, Dr. Dexter R. Buted, kicked-off the ICT Konek at Basista, Pangasinan in partnership with its Local Government Unit (LGU) headed by, Hon. Jolly R. Resuello.

PSU-LGU ICT Konek Project is one of PSU's hallmark projects during the COVID-19 pandemic which aims to provide learning space and resources for students through the strong partnership of the university to its stakeholders. The said project was endorsed and approved by the Sangguniang Bayan (SB) spearheaded by Hon. Bernard S. Doria, Municipal Councilor and Chairperson, Committee on Education and Culture.

At the inauguration, Dr. Buted praised LGU Basista for promptly responding to the call for partnership. Further, Dr. Buted promised to add 10 touchscreen computers to its existing units and reiterated that PSU is open in discussing other ways on how PSU can help LGU Basista in terms of education, livelihood, and community development.

In response, Mayor Resuello expressed his words of gratitude to PSU and to the rest of LGU Basista for making the ICT Konek Project possible. Further, Mayor Resuello assured the PSU students who were present in the ceremony, that upholding their right to quality education will always be LGU Basista's priority.

Meanwhile, Dr. Liza L. Quimson, Campus Executive Director of PSU-BC emphasized during the launch that the ICT Konek is a manifestation of PSU's efforts in ensuring that no student will be left behind during the new normal in education.

The established learning hub equipped with a strong WIFI connection is open from 8:00 AM to 5:00 PM, from Mondays to Fridays at the Day Care Center, near the municipal hall. This is for all PSUnians residing in Basista, Pangasinan who are currently enrolled in any PSU campuses. Some faculty members and non-teaching personnel were assigned to ensure that health protocols and physical distancing will be strictly followed.

PSU-BC also secured partnerships with other LGU's in the province of Pangasinan like the municipalities of Bayambang, Malasiqui, Bautista, Alcala, and Mangatarem. The launch of the ICT Konek in Malasiqui, Pangasinan will take place today, November 11, 2020. Launches of the ICT Konek Project in other partner LGUs will take place in the forthcoming days.

LGU Malasiqui Leagues thru ICT Konek

The Pangasinan State University – Bayambang Campus (PSU-BC) launched the PSU-LGU ICT Konek Project in the Municipality of Malasiqui, Pangasinan in partnership with its Local Government Unit (LGU), November 11.

The PSU-LGU ICT Konek Project is one of PSU's flagship projects amidst the COVID-19 pandemic that aims to provide students with learning spaces and services through the university's close collaboration with its stakeholders.

The launch highlighted the ribbon-cutting rites and signing of the memorandum of agreement respectively which were led by Municipal Mayor Hon. Noel Anthony M. Geslani and Dr. Liza L. Quimson, Campus Executive Director of PSU-BC.

Radio and TV-Based Instruction, Ready for Operation

Remote learning has been a challenge for many students as well as teachers—laptops, smartphones, and stable internet connections are just some of the things that are difficult to acquire as many Filipinos have lost their livelihood.

In this regard, Dr. Dexter R. Buted, University President will be introducing a new delivery modality – Radio and TV-Based Instruction, that can tailor-fit every learner’s needs, regardless of the limitations to remote learning in their area. The university has purchased Radio and TV Broadcasting equipment which will serve as an additional platform for public announcements, supplemental teachings and most importantly as vehicle to deliver instruction.

For TV and radio-based teaching, the University will soon be launching a TV Program—a program that converts self-learning modules into video lessons that will be soon accessible in USATV. The said instruction is supplemental to the previously established modalities of learning.

These multi-purpose appurtenances are a proof of PSU’ commitment in ensuring quality service and education. The University continues to allocate its resources to meaningful and purposeful projects that will benefit all its stakeholders. 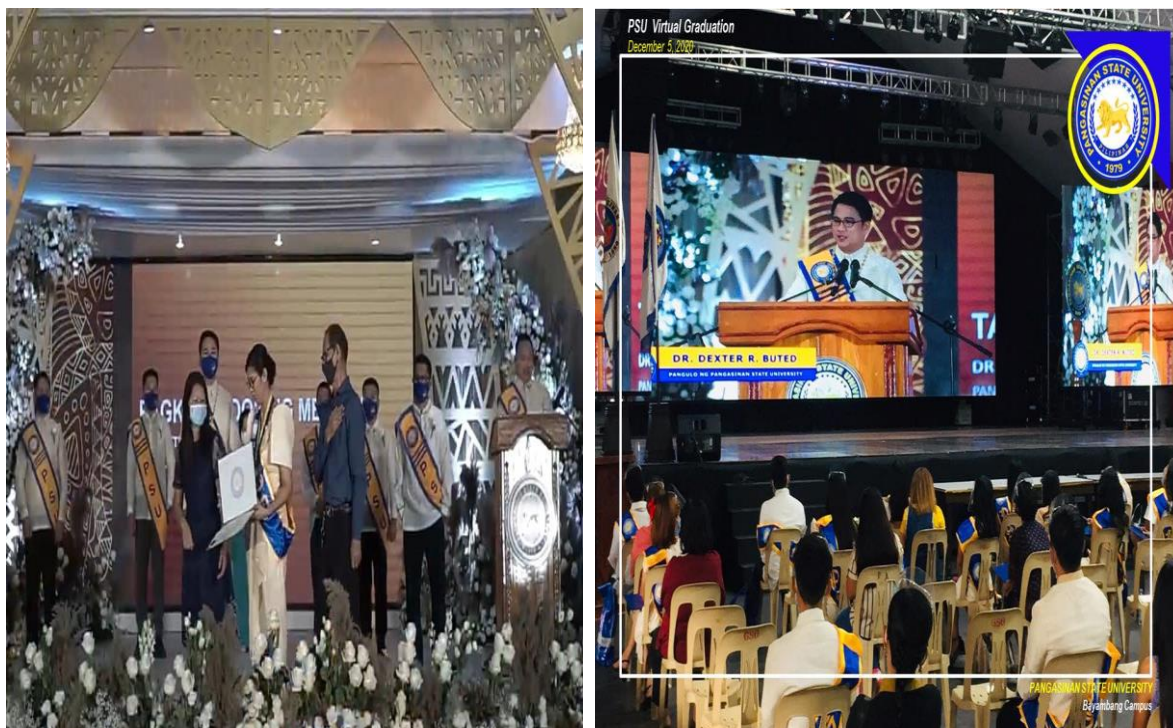

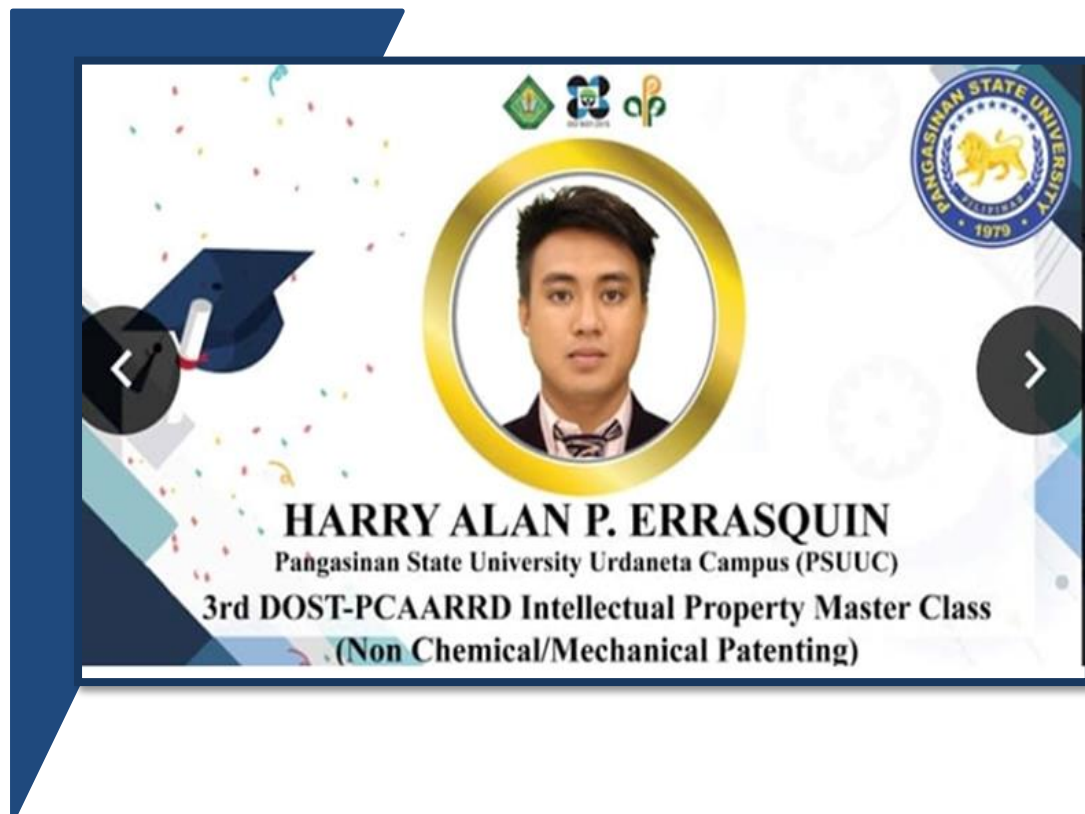

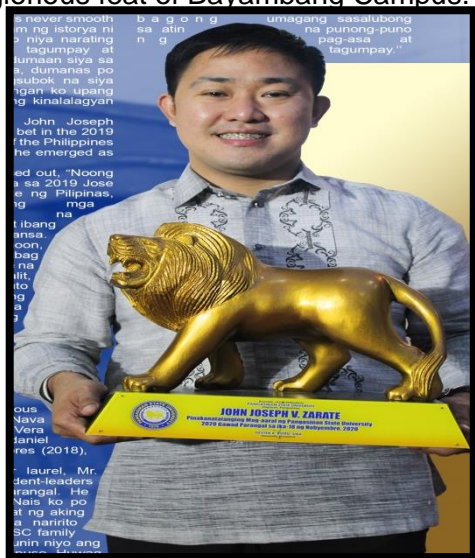
Blazoned Victor and Finalists

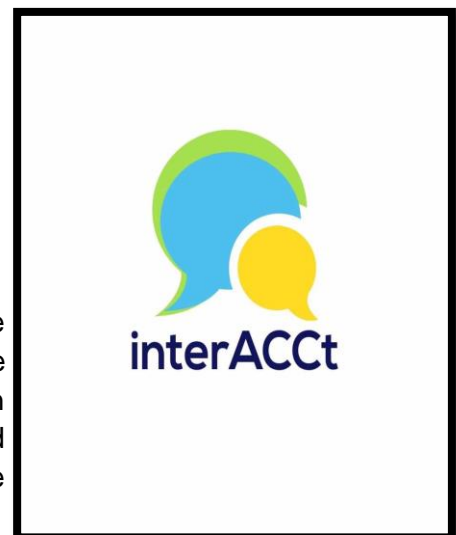
InterACCT: SSC-Student Services Talakayan

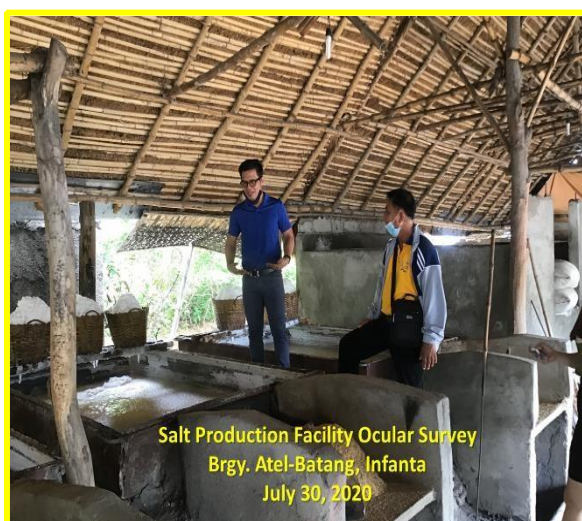
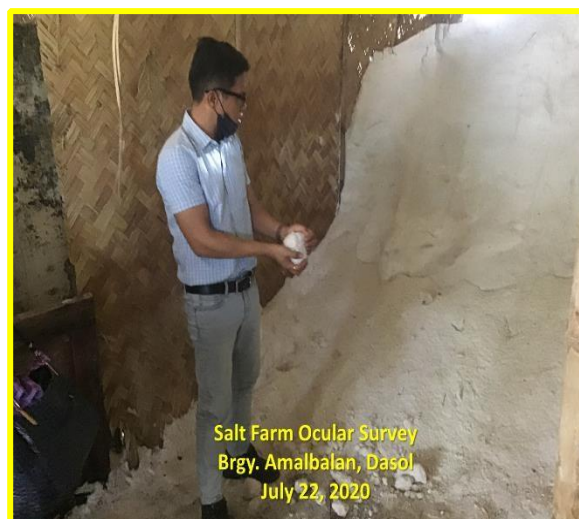
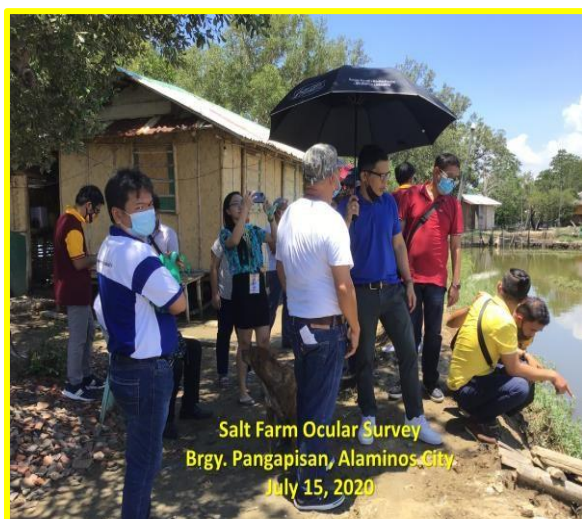

DOST-PCIEERD Subsidizes 6.5M worth Project to PSU

The Department of Science and Technology Philippine Council for Industry, Energy, and Emerging Technology Research and Development (DOST-PCIEERD) agreed to fund one of Pangasinan State University's project: Establishment of a Solid Freeform Fabrication Research Laboratory (SoFFRel).

Said laboratory was allocated P 6.5 million pesos to house 3D printing materials with potential applications to metal fabrication for students, faculty, and researchers of PSU. Moreover, facilities for automotive, blacksmithing and metal crafting using solid freeform fabrication will also be provided.

SoFFRel is the first 3D printing and metalcraft fabrication laboratory in Pangasinan. It is said to be located at PSU Urdaneta, home of the Machine Automation and Technology Innovation Center (MATIC).

The rapid prototyping and manufacturing technology (RPM), is an integration of many different disciplines. It generates an entity by first forming a series of layers according to the dispersed section information of the digital model, and then piling the formed layers sequentially together.

Later, with the progress of material and enabling technology, many new RPM techniques emerged out and have been already applied in the fields such as rapid tooling/moulding, direct formed usable part, nano-/micro-RPM, and biomanufacturing. With all these said, this will enable PSUnians' to materialize their blueprints relevant to rapid prototyping and manufacturing research (PSU Echoes, Vol XX No.2).

Said event is a premier international conference based in Singapore of wherein preeminent researchers gather and share their studies on Gender Equality and Women's Empowerment.

PSU is one of the prestige universities to participate in this leading conference together with other universities from thirty one countries.

Research Training November 10-11, 2020

Five PSUian researchers and two farmers were sent by Pangasinan State University to Mariano Marcos State University (MMSU) for training on alcohol production on November 10-11.

Said delegates were given training on utilizing and maintaining the MMSU 850-Lit Village Scale Reflux Distiller (M850 VSRD) – apparatus developed by MMSU that is used to separate the alcohol from the extract.

The Office of the Vice President for Research, Extension and Innovation has been working on producing ethanol from Nipa tree for it is abundant in Pangasinan. Moreover, said office hopes to distribute the finished product next year after the increasing demand on alcohol caused by the Covid-19 outbreak.



Demo Farm Visit for Moringa Seedling Distribution

By Virtue of the Memorandum of Agreement signed by the Department of Agriculture – Regional Field Office (DA-FRO) I, duly represented by Nestor D. Domenden, CESO IV as OIC-Regional Executive Director with the Regional Agriculture and Fishery Council (RAFC) led by Vincent A. Adorna, representing the private sector NGO forged a memorandum of agreement with Pangasinan State University headed by Dr. Dexter R. Buted, series of visits of the PSU-REI team headed by Dr. Paulo V. Cenas on proposed demo farm for organic moringa seedling production in the province of Pangasinan were conducted.

Dr. Cenas led the PSU-REI team on inspecting whether the target places were suitable for organic farming of said moringa seedling which are owned by the Farmer's Association.

It is noteworthy that the "DA-RFO 1" was given fund allocation under the RA 11494 or the "Bayanihan to Recover as One Act" (Bayanihan II) for expenditure on Agriculture Stimulus Package which includes Massive Seedling Production.

Thus, PSU is one of the identified recipient/implementers of the "Massive Malunggay Seedling Production" under the Bayanihan II. The DA-RFO 1 recognizes that the University within its regional jurisdiction have the sufficient infrastructure and capacity to produce planting materials and seedlings.

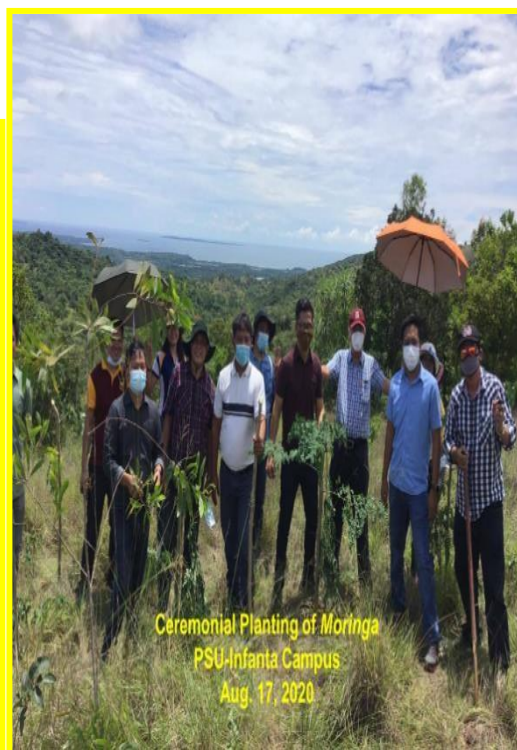
It could be accounted that the DA-RFO 1 and PSU within its regional jurisdictions have a long standing partnership established through previously implemented projects of the Department.

VP CENAS GREEN-LIGHTED RESEARCH ON DISINFECTANTS USING NIPA WITH MMSU AS LEAD SHEPHERD

The Director for Research and Development, Prof. Francis Albert T. Argente, VP for Research Dr. Paolo Cenas and their team started working on a research on producing ethanol and other alcohol-based disinfectants with Nipa.

The idea started this pandemic wherein the country is facing a health crisis. Pangasinan is the only province in Region 1 that grows Nipa. They thought that it would be sublime if they produce alcohol from Nipa. They were also inspired by the works of Mariano Marcos State University on alcohol production. Professor Argente quoted, "With the technology from MMSU they produced Alcohol from Nipa even if they dont have Nipa in Ilocos Norte. So, if they can do it why can't we do the same. That was the start and we realized that we can do more. With this we can do more series of this research".

The team is collaborating with other institutions for this ongoing project. Such institutions are Department of Science and Technology (DOST), Commission on Higher Education (CHED), and Central Luzon State University (CLSU).

On June 5, the PSU Bioethanol RDE Team went to Brgy. Bantayan, Lingayen, Pangasinan because it has large areas of Nipa Plantation. They discussed with the Barangay and Farmers' Organization officials the possibility of establishing a village-scale bioethanol facility in the community.

They also visited the bioethanol facility in Brgy. Pantal, Bugallon, Pangasinan to monitor the status of its operation. The facility was established in 2017 by CLSU and MMSU through National Bioenergy Research and Innovation Center (NBERIC) of which PSU is a partner institution. NBERIC also aims to develop biofuels from different feedstocks including Nipa.

On June 9, the team went to Tockok, San Fabian to introduce their project proposal to the barangay officials as they continue their search for potential sites of ethanol production.

PSU also benchmarked CLSU on their Nanotechnology injection on Ethanol Production. The event was done via Zoom with CLSU's Dr. Juvy Monserate and Dr. Marvin Cinense.

The Office of the Vice President of Research and Extension has been continually finding innovative ways through researching to serve the community better, especially in these times that where the world is battling through this pandemic.

Thru the initiative of the Gender and Development (GAD) Unit, about 30 teaching and nonteaching personnel participated in the event anchored by the theme “VAW-free community starts with me”.

“This orientation coincides with the third day of the annual nationwide observance of the 18day campaign to end violence against women and children,” Dr. Presley V. de Vera, GAD Coordinator, said.

The campaign which starts from November 25 to December 12, emphasizes everyone’s commitment and contribution to end violence against women and children presenting an ideal picture of a VAW-free community.

Dr. de Vera also added that the campus supports the anti-VAW efforts of the government as it encourages all members „to join the cause to end violence“.

As response, the Dr. Telesforo N. Boquiren Convention Hall was flooded by orange colored shirts which symbolize hope and optimistic future in support to United Nation’s campaign to anti-VAWC.

Moreover, various discussions were presented for the participants to understand deeply the VAWC Act.

Dr. de Vera presented the „VAWC Core Messages“ where she emphasized that VAW is not limited to physical abuse but can also take the form of emotional, verbal, psychological, economic and sexual abuse.

On the other hand, Atty. Rosenda dela Cruz discussed „VAWC Cases during the Pandemic“ where she cited some existing cases of VAWC in this time of situation.

Atty Marian R. Yanes also explained „Republic Act 9262“ to give understanding that VAWC is not just a major public health problem but also a grave violation of human rights.

In the end, the unit was very happy to gather public support from the participants as they were empowered to know and claim their rights, and educated on where to seek help in cases of violence.

Aside from the orientation, a webinar on anti-VAWC was already conducted last November 25, where the participants were students.

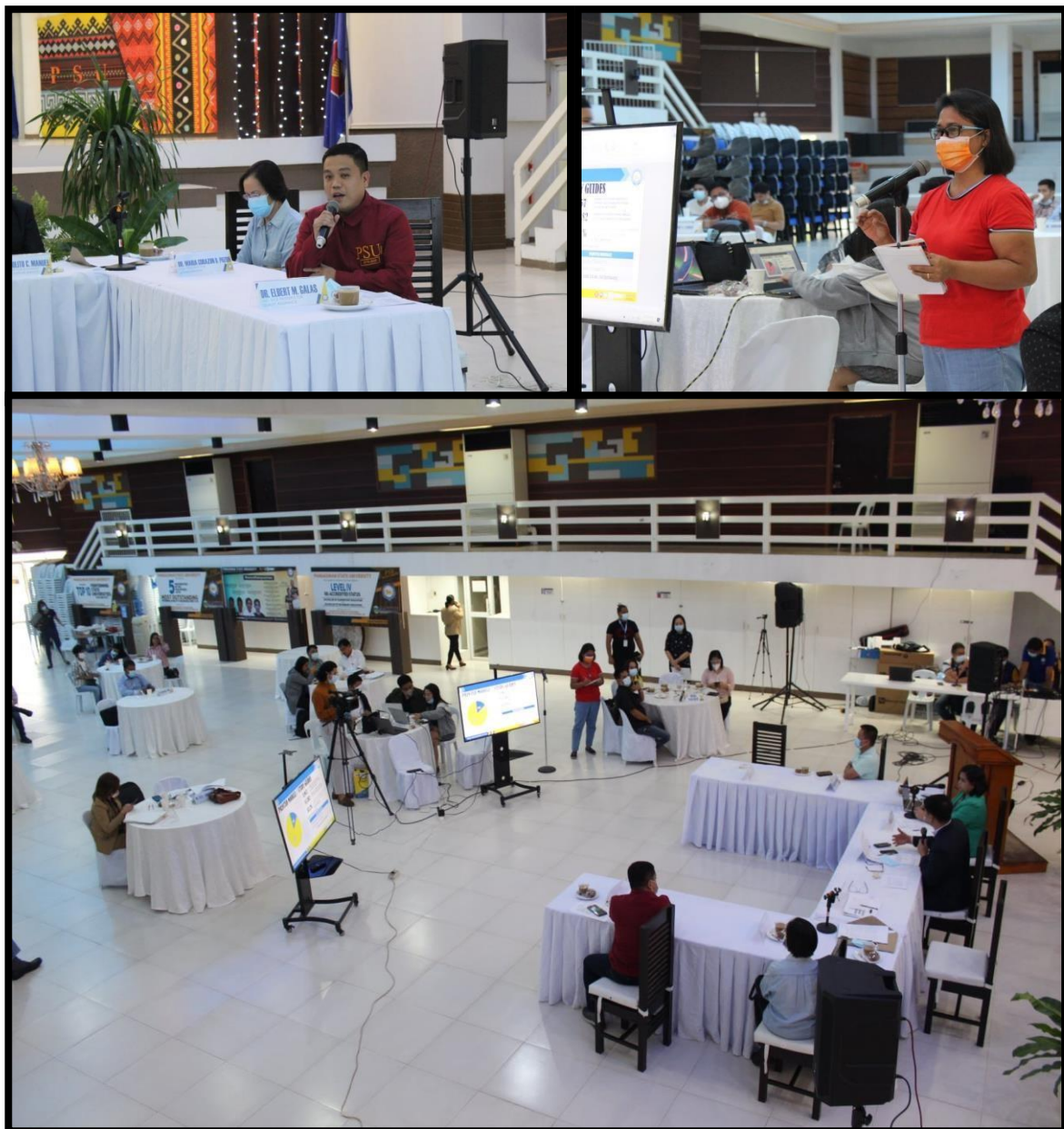
Local media partners such as People's Journal, Bombo Radyo, DWIZ, Net25 and DWIN were invited to dialogue with the university officials.

Unmodified auditor's opinion is the highest form of opinion that can be accorded to a government agency. It means that the financial statements of the agency are presented in accordance with applicable financial reporting frameworks and that they are in conformity with existing accounting rules and policies.

This recognition is a testimonial of Dr. Dexter R. Buted's leadership and commitment to PSU's manifestation of its Core Values such as Accountability and Transparency and Credibility and Integrity.

PSU TRUDGES AACUP ONLINE ACCREDITATION

BAYAMBANG, LINGAYEN, AND URDANETA CITY– Pangasinan State University through the Office of the Vice President for Quality Assurance headed by the newly appointed OICVP Dr. Elbert Galas hosted the very first Accrediting Agency of Chartered Colleges and Universities in the Philippines (AACUP) Virtual Accreditation through a university-wide opening program last October 12, 2020 via Zoom.

The said program was participated by different university and campus officials, faculty and stakeholders of the three (3) PSU campuses namely Bayambang, Lingayen and Urdaneta for a week-long accreditation from October 12 -17. In Bayambang campus, only BS Nursing is being accredited for Level 3 on Phase I whereas Lingayen Campus is aiming for Level II in BS Information Technology, BS Computer Science, and BS Hospitality Management. In Urdaneta Campus BS Civil Engineering, BS Electrical Engineering, BS Computer Engineering are being evaluated for level 2 and accreditors will revisit Area 9 of BS Architecture.

Purpose of the Accreditation

Accreditation is a vital process by which tertiary level institutions evaluates its educational activities, in whole or in part. It is an opportunity to seek an independent judgment to confirm if it substantially achieves its objectives and is generally comparable in quality to other institutions. Among the several benefits of accreditation include, lending prestige to accredited school justified by possession of quality standards and revealing the strengths and weaknesses that needs to be addressed.

For this purpose, PSU was given credit points in the area of normative financing, selections of Centers of Excellence (COE) and Centers of Development (COD), SUC leveling and assessing eligibility of graduates and faculty for advance education.

Preparations during the 1st Batch of Accreditation

The accreditation process is an in-depth one, involving considerable documentation from the institution undergoing accreditation. With several quality assurance tools that our university employ, we had seen so much growth in our operations, support services and governance which led us to fully embrace continuous quality improvement.

According to Dr. Dexter R. Buted, University President, “We are more focused on the findings and recommendations provided because from there, we tread the path to continuous improvement. This is the reason why we have pushed hard for the online accreditation to take place despite the challenges posed by the current pandemic.”

The Office of the Vice President for Quality assurance led by Dr. Elbert M. Galas ensured necessary preparations during the 1st batch of accredited programs. These includes the orientation on the new AACUP accreditation modality, guidelines, and phases of online accreditation. Guidelines on the development of landing pages were coordinated with the help of Dr. Julius Caesar O. Mamaril, Director of Information and Communication Technology Management and Prof. Celeste T. Mercado, Director of Public Relations, Publication and Information Office. Dr. Galas added that guidelines on the digitization of documents and evidences as well as the procurement of scanning equipment were enacted in response to the new normal accreditation.

Problems Encountered

CoVid-19 has affected the process of preparations of the accreditation since there was a paradigm shift in the modality of assessment. Since it is the first time for PSU to encounter virtual accreditation, the transition is just as challenging as the journey on flexible learning. Various Campuses have submitted their concerns in the Office of the Vice President for

Quality Assurance. Among the problems encountered were the use of platforms aside from Microsoft Teams (LMS) during the online interviews since most of the senior AACUP accreditors preferred Zoom application. Internet connection may be unstable to some stakeholders. They must also be oriented with the use of MS Teams. Plus, a large amount of files needs to be digitized. The limited computer, scanning equipment and camera with high specifications also posed restraints at some point. And the scarce human resource working for the accreditation due to the implementation of alternative working arrangement (work from home) gave additional burden to the work force.

Performance Appraisal

Though the pandemic served as a great hindrance in tailing our mission and vision, the University led by its visionary President with the arsenal of proficient and competent campus officials managed to overcome all odds. Among the strategies implemented to ensure success was the assignment of pool of local accreditors to assist programs due for accreditation. Foresight on the requirements of accreditation was evident and the timeliness set by the programs were met. In return, the University provides ample support by providing priority funding to resources needed in the accreditation.

This accreditation is a testament of PSU that even in the gnarly situation we are facing, our university still continues to serve as a prime mover of excellent service and quality education in our continuous pursuit to the fulfillment of our vision and mission. Through our pursuit for caliber, the University had been recognized by the Accrediting Agency for Chartered.

Colleges and Universities of the Philippines (AACUP) as one of the Top Performing State Universities and Colleges in the country in the past years.

PSU GOES FULL GEAR IN THE LAST ACCREDITATION FOR 2020

Another batch of campuses in Pangasinan State University is scheduled to be accredited this year by the Accrediting Agency of Chartered Colleges and Universities in the Philippines Inc. (AACUP) on December 7 to 11 to assess the university's excellence and quality service in its academic programs.

On the first day, an opening program was hosted by the Office of the Vice President for Quality Assurance headed by Dr. Elbert Galas alongside the Director for Institutional Assessment and Accreditation Dr. Weenalei Fajardo at the Dr. Telesforo Boquiren Convention Hall to communicate with the accreditors from different State Universities and Colleges from other regions via Zoom.

University President Dr. Dexter Buted welcomed the roster of accreditors while the Vice Presidents introduced their respective unit directors and heads afterwards.

"AACUP has greatly contributed in improving the academic programs we offer along different areas, ensuring that these programs produce competent and highly employable graduates in the future", Dr. Buted stated in his speech.

Dr. Buted also mentioned that through quality assurance, the PSU family is confident that they can reach greater heights and be of better service to the community. "With several quality assurance tools that our university employ, we had seen so much growth in our operations, support services and governance which led us to fully embrace continuous quality improvement, not to be perfect but to be a better performing university", he added.

Among the campuses to be accredited is the Sta. Maria Campus to which there Bachelor of Science in Agriculture will face Level 4 Phase 1.

Lingayen Campus will have both Bachelor of Public Administration and Bachelor of Science in Business Administration evaluated for Level 3 Phase 1. Moreover, the Bachelor of Science in Biology will undergo its Preliminary Survey Visit.

Asingan Campus has three programs to be accredited which are the Bachelor of Science in Information and Communication Technologies, Bachelor of Science in Education and Bachelor of Science in Elementary Education, all aiming for Level 3 Phase 1.

Infanta Campus will also have a Preliminary Survey Visit for its Bachelor of Secondary Education Major in Social Studies.

Furthermore, the School of Advanced Studies charts its Doctor of Education and Master of Arts in Education programs for Level 4 Phase 1.

The hardworking members of the university are hoping for positive results in this journey as this will benefit PSU through instruction, research, extension, and production as well as its stakeholders. Thus, earning the said titles will indeed serve as an early Christmas gift for PSUnians.



PSU-BC IN's Voyages to Level III

BAYAMBANG, Pangasinan – On October 12 – 17, 2020 the Institute of Nursing (IN) of Pangasinan State University- Bayambang Campus subjects itself to virtual accreditation. The accreditors from the Accrediting Agency of Chartered Colleges and Universities in the Philippines (AACUP) assigned to evaluate the BSN Program were composed of Dr. Marylou B. Ong of Cebu Normal University (CNU), Prof. Rulen T. Velicaria of University of Rizal System (URS) and Prof. Josephine TR. Tanciongco of Bataan Peninsula State University (BPSU).

Dr. Liza L. Quimson, Campus Executive Director of PSU-BC together with the area chairpersons headed by Dr. Cielo C. Fernandez, Dean of IN led the team during the weeklong AACUP Accreditation.

“To be Level III accredited means that the institution has met, to a certain degree if not 100%, the requirements set by the accrediting organization, more importantly, set by the governing agencies of nursing education,” said Dr. Cielo Fernandez in an interview. She also added, “Although there is COVID 19 pandemic, the preparation for accreditation went smoothly. The faculty who were supposed to be working from home still reported to ensure assigned tasks were accomplished. Health protocols were religiously followed by the task force as they worked for the accreditation. Indeed, COVID 19 was never a hindrance to the accreditation journey of PSU-Bayambang Campus, Institute of Nursing.”

Among the several challenges faced by the accreditation task force of PSU-BC were the gathering of documents way back 3 – 7 years, the digitization of the documents as the accreditation was online, the preparation of the website including the videos, the infrastructures, and most of all, manpower as the Institute of Nursing has only 10 faculty members. Despite these ominous challenges, the support of the Pres. Dexter R. Buted, University President and the unity of the PSU Bayambang family played a vital role in the success of the accreditation.

“The result of the accreditation was not yet given by the AACUP. But if the IN was luckily enough to pass the Level III accreditation, it will be of big help to the students because the level of accreditation of the institution speaks of the quality education the students have received, thus, it also manifests the quality of the graduates of the institution,” as stated by Dr. Fernandez.

The results of the Level III accreditation are expected to be announced in two to three weeks. (PSU Echoes, Vol XX No.2).

Internal Quality Audit (Nov 3-10, 2020)

PSU campuses undergo Blended Internal Quality Audit

Amid the challenges brought by the pandemic, the Quality Management System (QMS) Internal Audit of the university’s processes and operations was conducted through a blended modality. The audit started from November 3-10, 2020, asynchronously via remote and face-to-face site visit, while PSU Infanta campus was audited on November 27.

Dr. Weenalei Fajardo expressed positivity to the upcoming surveillance visit for the ISO 9001:2015 with SOCOTEC on January 2021, wherein findings and results of the internal audit will be discussed and presented to the Quality Management Representative for the University Management Review which will happen on December.

Audit holding areas were prepared for the face-to-face site visit with strict observance of health protocols. Internal auditors conducted the remote audit of some processes via Microsoft Teams. To assure the smooth conduct of blended audit, the nine campuses were divided into three clusters. The Western cluster with Dr. Weenalei T Fajardo as Audit Team Leader comprised of PSU Lingayen, PSU Alaminos and PSU Infanta. The Eastern cluster led by Ms. Ma. Odessa M. Pacaul as Audit Team Leader consisted of PSU Asingan, PSU Sta. Maria and PSU Urdaneta. The Central cluster led by Dr. Rosario Valencerina as Audit Team Leader consisted of PSU Bayambang, PSU Binmaley and PSU San Carlos.

Anent to this, an opening meeting presided by Dr. Elbert M. Galas, OIC-Vice President for Quality Assurance was held in the campuses to orient the internal auditors in assessing the effectiveness of the established QMS as a key element in the ISO 9001:2015 standard.

RRISK MGT UNIT HOLDS ORIENTATION-WORKSHOP

An Orientation-Workshop on Risk Management was held at DVITC, PSU Lingayen on Friday, December 11 to equip the coordinators/focal persons on the identification and evaluation of risks in our Quality Management System (QMS) process.

Dr. Grace Suratos, Head for Risk Management said that the university needs to give attention to and regularly implement, the risk-based approaches in its daily operations based on ISO 9001:2015. Following this are the four sub-units under risk management, identified as technology risk unit, disaster risk unit, health, safety & security unit and financial unit.



The workshop proper focused on the process of risk identification, assessment and development of risk management plan and its implementation in the monitoring and review.

Focal persons in the Risk Mgt. unit in the university level is composed of the Director for NSTP, Director for General Services Office, Director for ICTMO and Director for Budget Office, respectively. The Campus Executive Director however, acts as the Risk Manager in the campus level with coordinators in NSTP, Physical Plant Facilities, Accounting and ICTMO, respectively.

The workshop was graced by Dr. Elbert M. Galas, OIC-VP for Quality Assurance and Dr. Weenalei T. Fajardo, Director for Institutional Assessment and Accreditation.

ECQ RESPONSE DURING THE PANDEMIC

In just 6 short months, the world has become a very different place as coronavirus disease 2019 (COVID-19) has brought countries to a standstill, pushed hospital systems to the brink, and dragged the global economy into what may be the worst recession since World War II. The World Health Organization has declared this disease as a pandemic on March 11 resulting to strict precautionary measures to different countries including the Philippines.

Pangasinan State University has responded quickly even before the community quarantine was lifted. On March 9, a few days before the pandemic, our university officials had a meeting with the Pangasinan Health Office and Lingayen Municipal Health Office on how our province would be handling the pandemic on its state. Their meeting included how the university will conduct its classes and activities. On the same day, the Utility Workers facilitated by Dr. Barongan, Dr. Gutierrez, and Dr. Soroten had the Lingayen campus disinfected in response to the Lingayen Executive Order No. 17 Series of 2020 issued by the Office of the Mayor, Municipality of Lingayen.

Since then, the university has been disinfecting the premises of different campus regularly. PSU has also secured enough supply of PPE and disinfecting materials despite the shortage of supplies the market was experiencing due to panic buying of consumers.

However, on March 16, 2020, ECQ has been uplifted in Luzon. During that time, classes in all levels were also suspended. Residents were not allowed to go out unless there are important engagements needed such as meetings or grocery shopping. Companies and small businesses were also advised not to open, except for hospitals, grocery markets and other necessary businesses for survival.

In PSU, only selected offices and personnel were only open as per advised by the Office of the University President. These frontliners of PSU were the security guards, utility, maintenance, BAC Secretariat, Budget Office, Cashier, Accounting Office, and the medical personnel. Skeletal workforce was also enforced during that time wherein frontliners were only allowed to report at least once a week.

The work-from-home scheme was also implemented to limit face-to-face interaction among PSU employees. After all, we are already in the modern world wherein technological advances keep emerging, there are plenty of options that will put communications to an ease no matter what the distance is between people. Reports, communications, and even corporate meetings were done online. New platforms of communications were adapted such as the use of the application Zoom. This application can hold a video conferencing and group chat to over a hundred participants.

Faculty members also made sure that their students are updated as they classes were resumed through online platforms. Students were given a month to complete their requirements by sending them through email or by dropping the hardcopies to their respective campus drop boxes at certain schedules. Examinations were also conducted online.

No one knew that this unwanted situation would affect so much of our lives that lockdowns and postponements of events must happen. However, the university has managed to anticipate yet is still finding ways to adjust to the so-called “new normal” brought by this pandemic.

Luckily, not a single PSUnian, whether a student or employee had caught the virus prior and during the ECQ period. Still, the PSU family still hopes and prays for the welfare of the society and may this crisis end soon.

PSU'S HEALTH PROTOCOL

With the alarming threat of CoViD-19 and the increasing number of positive cases all over Pangasinan, Dr. Dexter R. Buted fortified health and safety protocols in Pangasinan State University. Aside from the guidelines mandated by the government and local government units, additional measures were taken into account to provide clear and actionable guidelines for safe operations through the prevention, early detection and control of CoViD-19 in PSU.

One of the strategies to keep PSU Covid free is to conduct daily disinfection in the offices and communal areas. Along with the disinfection are the following additional measures: No facemask, no entry policy, use of disinfection mats and temperature scanning upon entry.

In order to ensure that minimum health standards are observed, all incoming documents from other agencies and from the campuses shall be received by the PRPIO. Frontline service offices shall be covered with acrylic shield as protection between the PSU clients and employees. Documents from and to the offices in the main shall be hand carried by the staff of the concerned office. Likewise, visitors and guests shall only be entertained in visitors' lounge.

Dr. Buted also emphasized that precautions are necessary to prevent the potential spread of COVID-19. Having information and facts about COVID-19 will help diminish teaching and non-teaching employees as well as students' fears and anxieties around the disease and support their ability to cope with any secondary impacts in their lives.

STAY SAFE WITH STAYSAFE.PH

The Philippine government on September 2, launched the StaySafe.ph application as the official contact tracing program, which is a game changer to the country's COVID-19 response. StaySafe.PH is a project of the Interagency Task Force (IATF-EID) on Management of Emerging Infectious Diseases and National Task Force (NTF) on COVID19. The NTF is the Data Controller and Multisys Technologies Corporation as the developer of the website is the Data Processor. In the same way, Pangasinan State University adopts the Staysafe.ph which shall include the source code, all data, data ownership, and intellectual property of Multisys to DOH.



The Office of the President conducted a meeting with some university officials last May 22, 2019 to introduce this application to our fellow PSUnians. The officials downloaded the application to their mobile phones and were advised to promote this to their officemates as well as their family and friends. PSUnians can download a QR code that can be displayed in workplaces or establishments that when scanned will serve as a digital logbook that can be used for contact tracing.

Staysafe.ph is an online platform wherein users will report their health conditions as well as the health conditions of their community without disclosing sensitive information. Moreover, it empowers the public in the fight against COVID-19 by enabling people to report their health condition and facilitate the Government in contact tracing. By aggregating all reports, StaySafe.PH enables the Government to immediately respond to peoples' needs and make informed and timely decisions to keep Filipinos safe in the midst of this pandemic. This is to give ease to private sectors and local government units (LGU) in contact tracing so that preventive measures and proper assistance may be given to the suspected patients and their environment.

Distribution of face masks and face shields

September 24, 2020

The PSU Administration under the leadership of Dr. Dexter Buted distributed personal protective equipment and medical supplies to different campuses in response to the continuous rise of Covid-19 cases. Over 1500 boxes of face masks and 2000 pieces of face shields were given to all its employees. Each campus was also given a thermometer, and gallons of disinfectants for their sanitation and safety.



OPLAN FLU VACCINE STRIDE

While getting a flu vaccine will not protect against COVID-19, there are many important benefits, such as reducing the risk of flu illness, hospitalization, and death. Getting a flu vaccine can also save healthcare resources for the care of patients with COVID-19. Thus, Medical-Dental Office headed by Dr. Christia Marie Flores distributed 850 influenza vaccines to all campuses as part of the university's advocacy to ensure the wellness of its employees. The medical team started visiting each office on October 12 to administer the vaccine to employees of all status- whether permanent, casual, or job order.

According to Dr. Flores, the university has started giving flu vaccines since October 2017. But because of the Dengvaxia scare, a lot of employees started to doubt even the flu vaccination last 2018 and 2019. Since there is no cure for the Covid-19 yet, the flu vaccination serves as a preventive measure for employees especially that they still physically report to work.

“The flu vaccine may help a person prevent him/her from contracting any virus thus making him/her less susceptible to Covid-19 or any kind of flu-related diseases.” Dr. Flores explained.

For the first batch, Lingayen, Sta. Maria, Alaminos City Campus, San Carlos City Campus and the Main Office were scheduled.

However, even after getting a vaccine, PSU employees are advised to still exercise all the same cautious measures like wearing a mask, keeping physical distance, washing of hands and avoiding large indoor gatherings.

Dance videos, song covers, thank-you cards, online prayers. These are just few things of how people brought their expression of gratitude and motivation to frontliners. Different kinds of talent were exposed to spend their time wisely and be productive inside their homes. Of course, PSU had also an artistic trend to pay tribute to frontliners and motivate ourselves to win the battle against the epic coronavirus disease (Covid-19).

PSU has launched a frame on facebook wherein PSUnians can use in their profile pictures to as motive to work together to serve and survive this crisis. The frame has a caption "PSUnians! Let's fight Covid-19 Together" with an image of the golden lion on the side wearing a surgical mask. This is to promote determination of unending faith and hope in these times of crisis.

Creative frames is a feature on Facebook that has been a trend for years and it is usually used by users for brand awareness, usually to promote new strategies, outputs, or just merely to celebrate something for their organization.

MENTAL HEALTH WATCH DURING COVID-19

The PSU Mental Health Support Service created a Facebook page on April 1, 2020 for them to disseminate their agenda and help the PSU community on their concerns regarding mental health especially in these times of crisis.

PSUnians would just have to fill in an online form for some personal details for the counselors to give the most suitable service needed. It is affirmed that the information shared will be held confidential. According to the Admissions and Guidance Center, the office that holds the university's Mental Health Support Service, the client may use any mode of communication he or she prefers and they will respond. Most people prefer using Facebook messenger. However, some people wanted to communicate through call, text messaging or email. This is because they feel exposed with their Facebook profile. Even if the demographic information is given but confidential, people still want to keep their identities in incognito and that is respected by the office.

The office offers e-counseling and free therapy especially to those who suffer from anxiety attacks, insomnia, and family problems.

Since its launch up to the course of the quarantine, several callers had addressed their concerns, mostly students and a few faculty members. Fifty five percent were male and forty five percent were female. Among the callers expressed their loneliness during the quarantine period. Some experience emotional troubles caused by the academic shift due to the pandemic. Others had also expressed their support to the service by sharing positive thoughts towards it.

There are several ways to get distracted from the anxiety and other worrisome emotions. Thus, Ms. Danielle Madero, a registered psychometrician and guidance counselor of PSU, suggests to do journaling to be productive so that the brain will not be stagnant from boredom that causes overthinking. "Make it a habit to write. Write your feelings. Take down what you want to do today and the next day, what you want to have. ", she added.

She also suggests to do breathing exercise. "Take a moment out of silence. Internalize, every morning after you wake up and every night before you go to sleep. It"s like an insight of journaling."

It has extended help to more than 4,500 individuals through giving of food packs, face shield and face masks to frontliners, relief package to households and senior citizens as well as to stranded dormers, rice assistance to its employee and offering of free ride to frontliners using the university coaster.

Moreover, President Dexter Buted personally hands in snacks, sanitizers and face masks to the members of PNP and Barangay officials who tirelessly implement the Enhanced Community Quarantine in the province. The University provided free service ride to the medical workers of R1MC during the ECQ. It is a known fact that essential workers had difficulty getting to their workplaces because public transportations have been shut. In the same way, a free shuttle has been provided for the PSU employees that travel from Dagupan to PSU Lingayen and vice versa. The bus lays over in front of YMCA Dagupan at 7:05 in the morning and leaves PSU at exactly 5:15 in the afternoon. Dr. Buted also mobilized all the Campus Executive Directors to provide food packages and protective gears to the community especially to all the frontliners. This is also one of the many ways to show

appreciation and concern to the circumstances that these workers are into. This gesture is his way of recognizing and thanking these frontliners whose dedication to their service is admirable and unquestionable.

Dr. Buted is truly a model of generosity and compassion to others which positively radiates around PSU community to do the same thing in the communities where PSUnians belong.

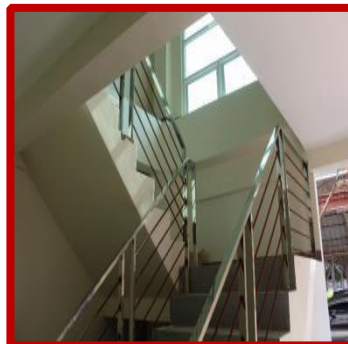

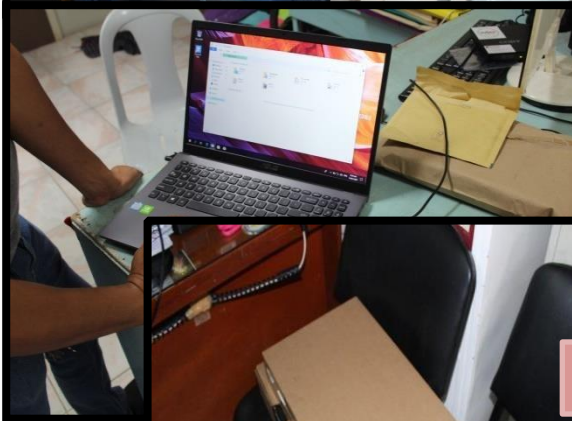

NATIONAL TRAINING PROGRAM FOR NEWLY HIRED TEACHERS WITH DOST AND 3NS

The Department of Education (DepEd), Department of Science and Technology – Science Education Institute (DOST-SEI) and Philippine Normal University in participation of Pangasinan State University (PSU) as member of the National Network of Normal School (3NS) in the Philippines spearheaded the national training program for newly hired teachers under R.A. 10612. The phase 2 of the national training program for the batch 2 transpired last September 4-5, 11-12 and 18-19, 2020 with fifty-four (54) teacher-trainees.

This training program is contextualized to immerse teachers in the reality of ICT-enabled learning environments. The training is designed to allow in-service trainees to access and interact with learning content online through PNU's learning management system (LMS). The learning tasks and activities were facilitated using varied ICT learning tools and platforms with the best outputs which were collaboratively selected and showcased by the teacher scholars through an e-Professional portfolio.

The Training Program for Newly-Hired Teachers under RA 10612 Batch 2 aims for the participants to demonstrate pedagogically sound and technically effective learning designs and methodologies appropriate for secondary level students (for both licensed and non-licensed teachers. In the same way, they are expected to manifest required competencies in the appropriate domains in the Philippine Professional Standards for Teachers (PPST) required of the beginning teachers (for non-licensed teachers) and proficient teachers (for licensed teachers). Lastly, to gain credit units for the renewal of their professional license (for licensed teachers only) and the minimum units in professional education courses required to qualify to take the BLEPT (for non-licensed teachers).

Right after the welcome remarks and statement of purpose delivered by the PSU University President, Dr. Dexter R. Buted, the keynote speaker, Dr. Juan Primitivo Petrola, an Education Supervisor of II of CHED RO-1, provided a walkthrough on the context, foundations and quality requirements of the teaching profession. Dr. Petrola vehemently jog the participants' memory that the teaching profession compels teachers to think of it as mission and a vocation which leads teachers to serve with love and compassion.

The participants were cheek by jowl with program, monitoring and evaluation of the program headed by its Training Director, Prof. Celeste T. Mercado. In the afternoon session on September 4, 2020 the participants undergone online pre-assessment using the e-PNU modality.

Said program led by proficient lecturers regarding several relevant topics as follows:

Topic 1 – Deepening One's Understanding of PPST by Prof. Celeste T. Mercado;

Topic 2 – eProfessional Portfolio Development based on PPST by Assoc. Prof. Agnes V. Baruela;

Topic 3 – Establishing School Culture: Factors and Processes by Dr. Amado C. Ramos;

Topic 4 – Inclusivity in Education: How the School Community Respond to Diversity Education by Dr. Razeale G. Fernandez;

Topic 5 – Linking the Past and Present of Education – Dr. Armando R. Junio;

Topic 6 – Worldviews: The Essentials of Thinking about Education by Assoc. Prof. Mitzy M. Macaraeg;

Topic 7 – Upholding the Ideals of a Professional Teacher: Relevant Laws and Statues for Teachers by Dr. Emmanuel Ross B. Tomas;

Topic 8 – The Filipino Teacher in a Globalized Context: Issues and Trends by Dr. Liza L. Quimson;
 Topic 9 – Developing Group Outputs for PPST-Based Competency Standards for Beginning and Proficient Teachers by Dr. Luzviminda Q. Ramos; and Reflection, Sharing of Learnings, Experiences and ways forward by Assoc. Prof. Perla G. Delos Santos.

The elaborated rationale, framework, basic concepts and quality requirements for teachers at different career stages set in the PPST would prepare the teacher-trainees to meet the desired quality for beginning teachers (for non-licensed teachers) and proficient teachers (for licensed teachers). The Pangasinan State University as a higher education institution is cognizant of its significant role to fight the battle with the looming enemy. To this extent, it has organized several activities under the leadership of its president Dr. Dexter R. Buted together with its academic community members.



Dr. Buted mobilized all of PSU's nine campuses through their executive directors to provide food packs (lunch and snacks) to those personnel in the checkpoints, essential service workers and medical workers who are at the forefront of combating the disease. A total of more than 3,000 food packs were distributed to those in the frontlines—the medical workers, PNP and DILG personnel, LGU skeletal staff, and Barangay officials.



In addition, keeping abreast with pandemic situation, Dr. Buted and the administration thought that the pandemic will negatively impact the employees economically, thus through the approval of the Board of Regents, allocated an amount to provide 25 kilograms of rice to employees whose salaries range from salary grade 1-15. Additionally, the salaries of the employees have been given weeks in advance to help them cope with the crisis brought by the pandemic.

Since PSU is situated in the capital town of the province, Lingayen, Dr. Buted coordinated with the LGU to identify the poorest barangays to be the recipients of food sustenance packages. With this, a group of PSUnians led by the University President went from one house to another to not just give dole outs in the form of food sustenance package (live broiler chicken, baked products, rice, grocery items) but also an avenue of —kumustahan||



where people get to share their situation to the PSU employees. The recipients were very grateful for the love and —malasakit|| extended to them.

And since, the senior citizens are one of the most vulnerable to the disease, the university thought of providing nutritious food to one selected barangay in Basista, Pangasinan. The said recipients were truly happy and grateful to PSU.

Lastly, students who were not able to reach home prior to lockdown or enhanced community quarantine imposed last March 16, 2020 were given goods (in three waves) in the form of grocery items and rice. This activity was initiated by Dr. Buted and the student regent who actually made it through their boarding houses and delivered the food packs at their doorsteps. Dr. Buted also offered one facility in the university that could accommodate them if they cannot pay their monthly rentals due to the crisis.

PSU-DOST FIC DELIVERS COVID-19 HEALTHY FOOD PACK AID

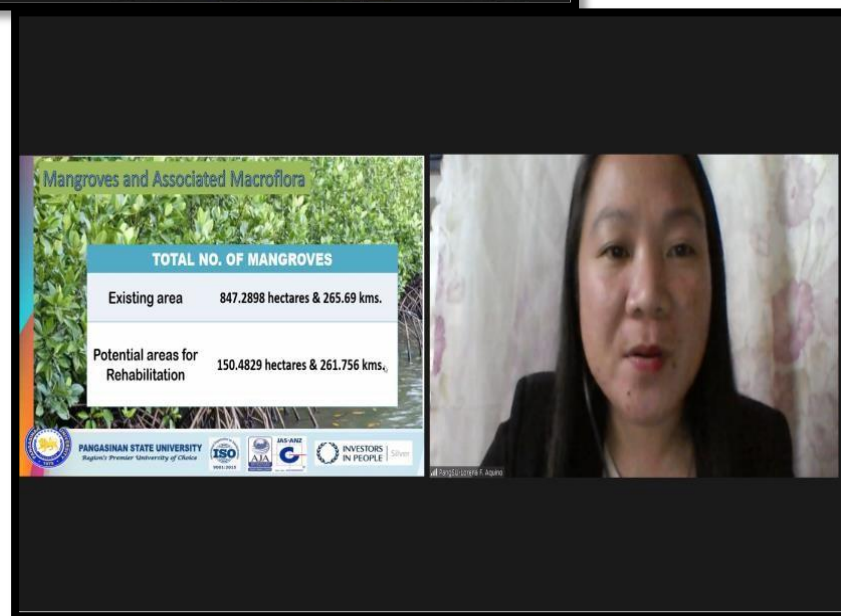
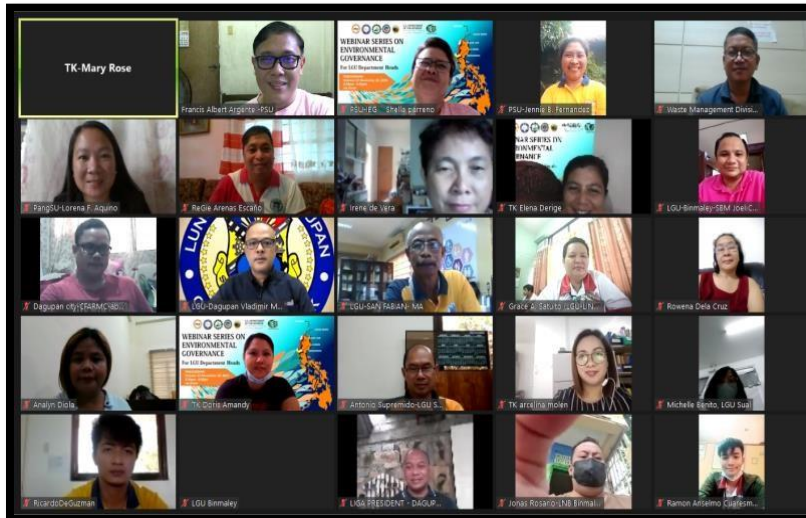

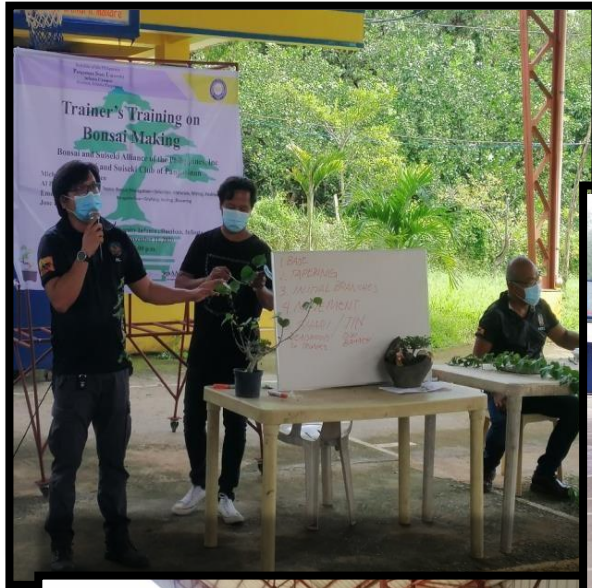

Since there were strict protocols when going out in public places, some students were still underaged to be qualified for a quarantine pass- a document that entitles the person to go out to public places such as public market.

Travel was also difficult for public transportation was prohibited, that is a number students who live in dormitories and apartments were not able to go back to their towns. Some students that even lived as far as Pampanga, Nueva Ecija and Cavite.

The Student Council were able to identify and contact the students through group chats in Facebook messenger and they also posted an announcement on their official Facebook Page. Over five hundred students were traced and given enough food supply.



The food packages include canned goods, noodles, bread, biscuits, and rice. The package also contained shampoo, soap, and other grocery items.

They were lucky to being able to provide the packages for their students for during those times, panic buying of consumers led to decreasing supplies of supermarkets. —It was difficult but I really want to help so I did my best||, Ms. Je-ann De Vera, SSG President said.

The Student Council had their personal share to buy the packages but they also asked for sponsors so that they could distribute the packages in three batches. The first batch was from the personal money of the SSG President herself, with the help of the University President Dr. Dexter Buted, and faculty member Mr. Christopher Mabazza, who also helped in delivering goods to the students. The second batch was from the grace of some unnamed sponsors. The last batch was from the support of Dr. Buted.

Dr. Buted also offered to interested students to stay at the Chinese House of the University.

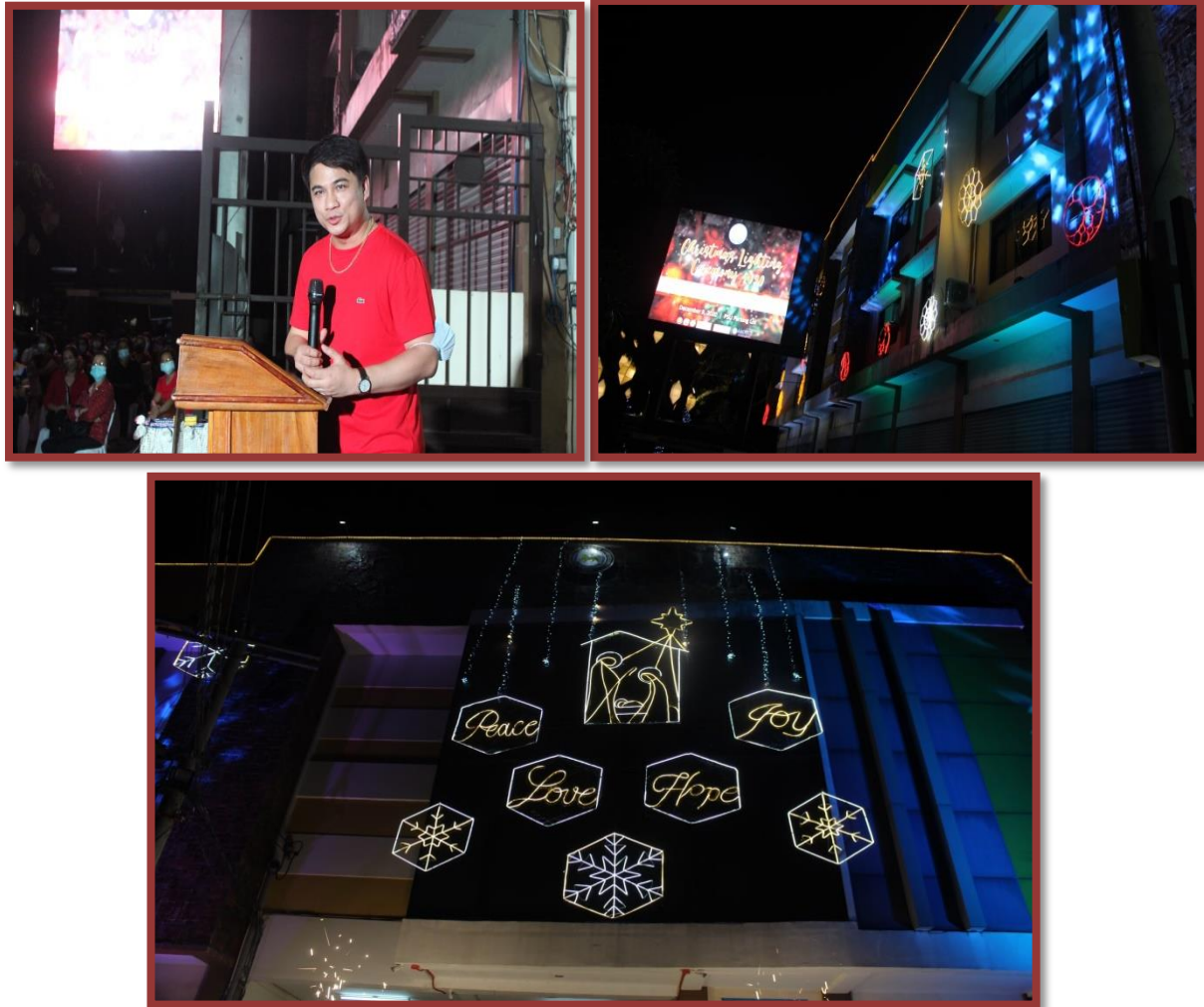

PSU Retrogrades Infocast, Now a Smart School

“Our goal is to become better than any other Private Schools, Universities and Colleges in order to provide quality education to all our students,” a statement emphatically delivered by Dr. Dexter R. Buted during the turnover on November 11, 2020.

Said undertaking was a nexus of partnership between Pangasinan State University and SMART. Mr. June Fel De Guzman, Area Dev’t Manager and Mr. Bong Gamboa, NCL Head Community Solutions handed over the pocket wifi and Infocast system to Dr. Dexter R. Buted along with some University Officials. Also present in the said affair were Atty. Darius B. De Guzman, Director of University Legal Services and Dr. Julius Caesar O. Mamaril, Director of ICTMO.



The event facilitated by Prof. Celeste T. Mercado, Director of PRPIO started with a prayer followed by the message of Mr. Bong Gamboa and Mr. June Fel De Guzman. According to Mr. Gamboa, “We came here to give you the device and the Infocast which will compliment as an additional information tool to communicate with the students.”

Infocast serves as an additional platform for students and other stakeholders in the event that there is no internet connection during their learning. The said system will be operated by the MIS while the PRPIO is in-charge of creating information to be disseminated. It is for this reason that the University made a subscription to SMART Infocast Solutions.

In response, Dr. Buted gave a short background of the University and said, “PSU has more than a thousand teaching and non-teaching personnel with more than twenty five thousand students making our University the biggest in Pangasinan.”



He also added that according to the survey conducted by the University, “We are having more than 70% problem in terms of connectivity which affects flexible learning.

Next problem is gadget, for almost 95% of the students are from the family of farmers and fishermen.”

PSU has been creating relentless activities to aid students in their problem during the new normal. It is the goal of the University to forge lasting partnerships that will create a better and brighter world for our students.
